

Frs. Crawford, Hartigan Exemplify Spirit, Dedication

When Fr. Francis Crawford, O.S.A., became Principal of Mendel in September, 1968, he brought to Mendel an enthusiastic and invigorating spirit. In his third year as Principal, still addressing the student body with a vigorous "Mendel Men!" he has upheld and bolstered this spirit, instilling in the students a new sense of dedication, pride, and loyalty towards their school. Fr. Crawford holds a Specialist degree in Education from DePaul University and a Master of Arts degree from the Catholic University of America.

Fr. Crawford's contagious spirit and love for the school has spread to the students which has helped them to become loyal and mature Mendel Men.

Fr. Daniel Hartigan, O.S.A., has completed his third year as Prior of the Mendel Monastery. He also is the Superintendent of the Augustinian Secondary School System. Before coming to Mendel in 1964, he had completed his education at Loyola University with a Doctor of Education degree. In 1951 when the school was founded he came to Mendel as a disciplinarian and teacher. In 1964, he returned to Mendel as Principal after a brief stay at Tolentine College. Vitally interested in school activities and events, Fr. Hartigan continues to demonstrate a dedication which is analogous with his presence.

Fr. Thomas Martin Joins Mendel's Administrative Staff

Emphasis by the administration, which consists of the Principal and six Vice Principals, has been placed upon school discipline and organization, curriculum planning, and development of faculty and students. School policies are determined, votes are taken on proposals, and school events, calendar, activities are set at meetings which are held every Tuesday and Friday.



Fr. John Tyma, O.S.A., is the Director of Studies and Chairman of the Curriculum Council. He prepares student and teacher schedules, handles student registrations, and records, and supervises bus transportation.



Fr. William Griffin, O.S.A., who is the Vice Principal in charge of discipline, supervises student attendance and conduct. His office directs regulations concerning student behavior and suitable sanctions for violations.



Fr. Ronald Turcich, O.S.A., who coordinates the events and activities of the school, is the Activities Director. He makes announcements for the school, directs the Candy Drive, and supervises homecoming week-end.



Fr. La Vern Flach, O.S.A., who coordinates the guidance programs, is the Director of Guidance. His staff watches student scholastic progress, conducts testing programs, and provides educational and college counseling.



Fr. Thomas Martin, O.S.A., Director of Religious Activities, provides a program of spiritual growth for all students. Classroom instruction, days of renewal, retreat programs, and class Masses supplement this program.



Fr. Erwin Dodge, O.S.A., Athletic Director, supervises athletic programs and schedules. He promotes spirit among the students, provides needs of the players and acts as a mediator between coaches, players, and school.

Theology

New Programs Stir Student Interest, Activities

In order to help students mature spiritually and intellectually, the theology department has instituted a new program of student-teacher activities.

A new monthly mass schedule has been developed by Fr. Thomas Martin, the school chaplain. Every student then attended Mass once a month and participated in an interesting liturgical program.

Every student had the opportunity to attend one of Mendel's retreats. These retreats were run by Mendel's religious faculty and Augustinian seminarians who developed a rewarding program for spiritual growth. Seniors attended closed retreats at various retreat houses in the Midwest.

Regular classes and homework have been made more interesting with the addition of audio-visual aids and engaging in small discussion groups. Together with the new programs, these classes have helped to achieve the department's goal of spiritual growth of each person.





Science

Mendel Students Place 2nd in State Science Fair

Honor was brought to the Science Department when twenty-eight of its students qualified for the Illinois Junior Academy of Science State exhibition. Of these twenty-eight, nine students received Outstanding Awards, the highest awards in the State. The cumulative points earned Mendel the second place trophy. The success of these students was made possible through hours of work under the guidance of their teacher.

The Science Department and the Science Club have set up seminars for students interested in entering the fair. These discussions between students and teachers helped to prepare the students for the judging of their projects. Also three new opportunities were available to the students. These were NASA-National Science Teachers Association Youth Science Congress held in Cleveland, Tomorrows Scientist and Engineers scholarship contest, and Westinghouse Science Talent Search Contest.

Much of this extra-curricular study was an out-growth of the experimental attitudes, approaches and procedures obtained in the classroom. This was the major objective of the department. In order to develop interest in the many aspects of science the students submitted a research paper or project. The teachers then selected from the students' entries the thirty projects that will enter the district fair.








Eighty Seniors Have Choice of Three Advanced Courses

More than 70% of the Mendel students took a course in mathematics. Many of the underclassmen were assigned a project not only to encourage an appreciation of math, but to help the students to understand the methods and mechanics of problem solving. Top projects were used for presentation at Open House. Some of the seniors researched topics and presented their papers and findings to the class.

Three different math courses were offered to the

seniors. Fifteen students chose to take college calculus which was taught by a professor from Olive-Harvey College. Fifty-five more seniors enrolled in one of the two levels of mathematics analysis.

The number of freshman math books was reduced to a single text. The teachers then assigned homework according to class ability and pace. Students were required to prepare their homework with the hope of eventual presentation on the blackboard.





Seniors Study Speaking, Writing in Film Productions


To teach writing fundamentals and composition techniques was the main goal of the English teachers. In some classes this entailed writing and giving of speeches while in others it involved writing essays. As an offspring of this program Ron Williams, junior had an article published in the **Tribune's** "Voice of Youth" column.

Again the department was able to use the closed-circuit television system to bring to the classroom such reproductions as *Julius Caesar*, *Hamlet*, and *Canterbury Tales*.

As an innovation to the Curriculum and to appreciate the value of literary work, senior classes spent the fourth quarter analyzing, as art forms, the various techniques of writing and speaking in film productions.






Teachers Aim Towards Four Year Programs in Each Language

To develop the four basic language skills — listening, speaking, reading, and writing, the language department purchased new equipment. This equipment included a new tape-recorder and a filmstrip projector.


In advanced language courses slides, covering literature, history, art, music, and culture helped to make the students more aware of the language they were taking.

German III and IV have been put on a semi-modular schedule. Assignments dealing with Germany's culture were given and discussed in each class.


Ultimately the goal of the language department is to incorporate a four-year program in each language.








Mr. Terrence Kavanagh Becomes New Department Chairman



In the future the department plans to expand the available literature library and purchase paperbacks that emphasize topics on wars, revolutions, ecology, and social problems. The teachers also plan to include in their syllabi special content on World War II, French and Russian revolutions, and Afro-American topics.

Department Adds Three Machines to Its Fleet

With the addition of three new machines, a 602 Calculator, a 402 accounting machine, and a 514 reproducer, the Data Processing department, under the direction of Father John Kret, has introduced a "hands on" program in teaching. In this program the students not only learned about the machines but also operated them in lab periods twice a week.

Outside of the classroom activity the students have taken a field trip to Pullman Bank. The department has also heard speakers from Data Processing colleges.


Even with the addition of these new ideas, the Data Processing department still keeps the school's records efficiently. This also included processing report cards, making student schedules, and billing.

Along with the new books were added more visual aids including bookkeeping transparencies and screens and typewriting charts.


Another curriculum change included a revised class procedure in bookkeeping with better explanations


Instructor Mr. Harrison Adds New Strength to Gym Staff


Each student was made aware of his physical capabilities as well as incapabilities. A balance of calisthenics and team sports helped to build strength, endur-

One of the objectives to be achieved in a gym program is to learn how to do the various forms of calisthenics in the proper






South Section champs in 1968 and 1969, the 1970 Monarchs failed to make the Catholic League playoffs for the first time in the last three years.




Jim Calderone scores a touchdown in the Leo Lion game. Joe Fiaoni [67] and Nick Vukelich [89] clear a path for him.

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
South Section Champs Lose in Finals by One Point






























Afro-American Club




One year of experience has fully established the Sophomore into patterns of Mendel. During this time the Soph conquered the atmosphere of the campus and detected the techniques of his teachers.






