




### Mendel Matmen Reign as All-Chicago Champions



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

The Mendel Catholic Prep Frosh-Soph team scorced forty-six points to place second behind Brother Rice in the Catholic League track finals held on Sunday, May 15th, at Hansen Stadium. Standings of the local Catholic League teams were as follows:

# MENDEL WINS DISTRICT COMPETITION

A strong Mendel Catholic Prep track team moves on to the State Finals being held at Eastern Illinois University on May 27th and 28th, after winning the Class AA District competition at Richards High School on May 21st, against eighteen other private and public schools. Leo High School and Oak Lawn finished second and third respectively.

As expected, Senior Robert James led the Mendel charge, winning both the 100-yard dash (9.9 sec.) and the 220-yard dash (22.7 sec.). But surprising to many was the second place finish in both of the above varsity level dashes by Mendel Sophomore, Al Palmer. Other outstanding performances by Mendel upperclassmen in varsity competition were a first in the 440-yard dash (50.2 sec.) by Sophomore Kevin McKinley, fourth in the 880-yard run by Sophomore Harry Wilkins, seventh in the triple jump (40.5 ft.) by Freshman Calvin Robinson, and fifth in the 440-yard dash (51.7 Sec.) by Junior Roger Pamplin.

Wins in both the mile relay (326.4 sec.), the 440-yard relay (43.7 sec.) and third and fourth places in the shot put by Mendel Seniors Greg Smith (53' 4") and Hank Meyers (49') rounded out the successful effort to win the District Trophy for Mendel.

Greg Smith, Robert James, Al Palmer, Kevin McKinley, and members of the Mendel 440-yard and mile relays have all earned the right to compete in the State Class AA Finals at Eastern Illinois University. ### Quincy's streak comes to a shocking end

Mendel's bench goes wild after the Monarchs' stunning 53-52 victory over previously unbeaten Quincy in Saturday's Class AA semifinal. By Jerry Shnay

CHAMPAIGN-It was a shot that killed a dream.

Mike Hampton, Mendel's sensational shotmaker, firethome a 25-footer with two seconds left Saturday to give the Monarchs a stunning 53-52 victory over Quincy's heartbroken Blue Devils in the semifinals of the Class AA tournament.

An Assembly Hall crowd of 13,596 witnessed one of the most incredible contests in tournament history, decided only after Quincy's All-America guard Bruce Douglas missed a last-second shot after a length-of-the-court pass by his brother. Dennis.

It was a bitter defeat for Quincy, which entered the game with 64 consecutive victories [an all-time Illinois high school record] and visions of becoming the first team to win back-to-back unbeaten championships. Instead, this game will be remembered as the only game in two years the Blue Devils didn't win.

HAMPTON, WHO HAD 26 points, teamed with Andre Banks to account for 47 of the Monarchs' points. Hampton, who says he works on long-range shots "all the time in practice," took a high inbounds pass from guard Jim Williams with five seconds left. He wheeled around, eyed the rim from the right quarter court and let fire.

The ball barely flicked through the netting, cutting the life from the thousands of (ans dressed in blue.

Hampton's shot takes its place in state tournament history alongside the last-second efforts of Carver's Anthony Smedley in 1963 and Morgan Park's Larry Smith in 1976. Both of those decided state titles.

As much as Hampton's heroics won the game, it was a technical foul on the Monarchs for not coming out of their zone to guard Quincy in the final 32 seconds that changed the tide.

OFFICIAL MARVIN CARLSON had waved Mendel out with a warning with 90 seconds left and Quincy holding the ball for one shot with the score tied at 51. Reserve center Sarterial Harris stepped out, but soon went back into the middle. With 32 seconds left, Mendel was given the technical.

"We had to change our strategy," said Mendel coach Mike Flaherty. "We just wanted them to play for one shot and maybe get a five-second call or a bad pass. After he [Mark Sparrow] made the free throw [making it 52-51], we had to go out and get them."

Bruce Douglas missed the front end of one-and-ones with 30 and 23 seconds left. The second time Mendel got the rebound and rolled downcourt.

"I wanted them to call time out. We wanted to set up a play with Hampton and Andre," said Flaherty, but the Monarchs didn't call for time until 11 seconds remained.

FLAHERTY WANTED to get the ball inside quickly to Banks for a quick turnaround, but suddenly, there was Dennis Douglas, Quincy's 6-foot-5-inch junior, stepping toward the bass and intercenting the ball.

But Douglas couldn't hang on to the ball. It trickled out of his hands out of bounds with five seconds left. "Dennis blames himself for not holding on to the ball." said Quincy coach Jerry Leggett. "If he had just managed to hold it. Golly."

Flaherty admitted the same. "I guess in those last five seconds we got a little lucky."

By the time Quincy got officials to recognize it had called time, there was just a tick on the clock, which had gone to 0:00. But what a last moment it was, even though it wasn't seen in Chicago because WGN-TV [Channel 9] thought the game was over and switched to another program.

DENNIS DOUGLAS WOUND UP and threw the ball 94 feet. It was an alley-oop pass to Bruce [a play the brothers had worked on for years]. Bruce went up to get the tip, touched it and banked the ball off the glass. The official signaled the basket would be good if it went it. The horn sounded, and the ball bounced off the top edge of the rim.

Bruce Douglas was spread-eagled on the ground, unable to move for nearly a minute while the fans buzzed, roared or cried, depending on their affiliation. He'll be back in Assembly Hall next year, doing dazzling things for the Illini, but this time he was on the losing side for the first time since his sophomore year. He wound up with 13 points and Dennis had 18.

Quincy got off quickly, rolling to a 6-0 lead and holding five-point margins twice in the first quarter. But Mendel's poised Monarchs foiled Quincy's press early and Legget had to call it off before the end of the first half. Alumni

#### **EXCELLENCE NO** STRANGER

In big, capital, Quincy-mocking blue letters the sign in the Mendel Catholic gym shouted "WE DID IT!"

Soon another banner will join the reading matter that hangs from the ceiling at 111th Street between King Drive and Indiana.

It'll say, in Mendel's navy and the lighter Blessed Mother blue, that Mendel came within one game of winning a state championship in basketball.

In a way it'll be an admission of defeat.

Second place. Runnersup.

But nobody else in two years has been able to beat Quincy, and even the championship game loss to East St. Louis Lincoln won't shrink the size of the WEDID IT sign.

Tuesday, with the brassiest band in any Chicago high school pumping up the Mendel student body with the theme from "Fame," Father Joseph Stobba, Mendel's principal, reminded both the team and schoolmates that because of what they had accomplished, people for a long time are going to be, like "Fame's" lyrics say, remembering their name.

"This," the Augustinian said, "is a continuation of a long tradition of excellence at

Mendel Catholic.'

Memories were brought back out for these teen-agers to hear, memories of basketball titles of the past, memories of the 99-match winning streak in wrestling, memories of the city football title.

"We didn't even have enough money to have matching uniforms," Father Stobba recalled, "but just a few years later we won a

city championship in football!"

But that success, like that of this year's basketball team, meant more because of the hard times that preceded the greatness.

"The guts of this place were practically pulled out." Father Stobba said, remembering the most recent hard times. "We experienced rapid, devastating white flight."

But we went to the black community and asked, 'Do you want a Mendel?' They said, 'Yes, we want a black Catholic prep school, provided it's No. 1, the best."

He credited John Cardinal Cody for providing support and funds -"over a quarter of a million dollars" - to keep Mendel going.

"What happened on Saturday, it was the shot heard 'round the state," Father Stobba said.

"It was the signal that Mendel has not died."

#### GOVERNMENT GRANT AWARDED **MATH STUDENTS**

Mendel Principal, Rev. Joseph A. Stobba, O.S.A., has announced the reception of a government grant to assist Mendel Algebra students.

The title of the grant is, Computer Assisted Instruction in Algebra for Mendel Catholic High School.

The agency accepting the request and awarding it is the Illinois Center for Educational Improvement-Chicago Link:

The author of the presentation is Carolyn M. McPherson, Chairperson, Science Department at Mendel.

"The program will give one class of Algebra students the benefits of computer assisted instruction in addition to their regular classroom instruction," McPherson explained.

'This group's scores on standardized tests will be compared to a control group that does not have the computer assisted instruction," she continued.

"As scientists we do not wish to anticipate the outcome, but it could have significant impact on our method of presentation in the future," the Chairpersn emphasized.

"The funding will cover the cost of creating the materials, the cost of two printers for student use that will be attached to microcomputers already available at the school, and the in-service training for a member of the faculty who will conduct the program," said Father Stobba.

"We are happy to receive this grant and particularly rejoice with the Science and Math Departments for their continuing efforts to combine the best of the old tradition and the reinforcement of the newer instructional aids," concluded Father Stobba.





# Mendel captures wrestling crown

The Mendel High School Monarchs captured the Chicago Catholic League wrestling crown in the championship meet held Saturday, February 5th, at Mt. Carmel.

Two Mendel wrestlers, Victor Ford and Greg Smith, won individual championships. Ford brought the Monarchs their first individual championship in five years, defeating Anthony Lisa of Loyola for the 138 lb. division title. Smith followed suit later in the meet, clinching the crown for the Monarchs with his victory over Bob Holley of Gordon Tech in the heavyweight division.

The Monarchs added to their tally with four second place finishes, one third place, and one fourth place. Second place honors went to

Michael Clifton in the 119 lb. division, John McGruder, 145 lb., Jinks Riddle, 167 lb., and Leandrew Moore, 185 lb. Steve Fortenberry placed third in the 132 lb. class. and Howard Williams finished fourth in the 126 lb. class.

Winning a championship in the powerful Catholic League is an achievement for any school, but the Monarchs' accomplishment is even more remarkable, considering the obstacles they have had to overcome.

"In the past two years, our wrestling program has been rebuilt from scratch," commented veteran coach Don Ledin, who is in his ninth year at the helm of the wrestling Monarchs. "In the 74-75 season, at a time when many people thought we couldn't survive racial

change, we had only six men with wrestling experience, and two of them weren't good enough to make the team. We finished sixth in the League that year. Last year we placed fifth, and we won this year, even though we have the smallest enrollment of any of the nine teams that competed. Unlike some of the other teams, we don't have 'feeder schools' we can rely on to provide us with athletic prospects. Our men have not wrestled in park programs before they come to Mendel. We have to teach them everything."

The Monarchs' 16-4 dual meet record and their Catholic League title attest to the outstanding job done by Coach Ledin and his dedicated corps of

wrestlers.
