#### Administration Welcomes Three New Members

Due to two transfers and a resignation, three new members joined the Administration in September. Emphasis by the Vice-Principals have been placed upon school discipline and organization, crowd control at events, and self-development of faculty members and students. All recommendations aim towards development of individual needs.

The administration, with its six Vice-Principals, is headed by the Principal, Fr. Francis Crawford. School policies are determined, proposals are voted upon, and

school calendar, events, and activities are set at administration meetings which are held twice weekly.

The Curriculum Seminar, made up of the department heads, is under the direction of the Administration. It meets monthly to discuss, evaluate, and make recommendations on existing programs and problems.

As a whole the Administration is an organization through which things are accomplished for the school, and it has exemplified the spirit, dedication, initiative, and perseverance which has been typical of this year.



Fr. John Tyma, O.S.A., directs the program of studies and heads the Curriculum Council. As Director of Studies, he prepares student and teacher schedules and handles student registrations and records.



Fr. William Griffin, O.S.A., who is the school's disciplinarian, supervises student attendance and conduct. His office draws up regulations governing student behavior and determines suitable sanctions for violations.



Fr. Ronald Turcich, O.S.A., Director of Activities, coordinates various school events and activities. He directs the Homecoming Week-end, conducts student assemblies, and makes announcements for the school.



Fr. La Vern Flach, O.S.A., Guidance Director, coordinates guidance programs and watches student scholastic progress. His staff provides educational and vocational counseling and conducts testing programs.



Fr. Thomas Leo O.S.A., Director of Religious Activities, provides a program of spiritual growth for all students. Retreats, spiritual renewals, class Masses, and classroom instruction supplements this program.

### Research on Unknowns Plague 140 Chem Students

To motivate students towards inquiry, scientific research and independent study are the objectives of the Science Department. To develop these aims each science student was required to submit a science research paper on the topic of his choice. All "A" or "B" students were required to submit a project to coincide with their paper. Also all chemistry students were given different unknown solutions of chemicals to be analyzed through independent work and study. Experimentation on the unknowns, done after school hours and on week-ends, lasted from February to June. This length of time gave all the students ample number of hours to complete their work.

In the line of new books and equipment, the chemis-

try department purchased new centrifuges and a PH meter. New books, periodicals, and reference books in all fields of science were available to the students. To further the student's interest in science a new renovated Science Club, under the leadership of Mr. Thomas Wojcik, held various seminars and field trips.

With five modern science laboratories and a revised curriculum placing emphasis on inquiry and practical laboratory experience, the student prepared himself to think independently and to adjust to a demanding college program.

A record of 110 students entered projects in the annual Science Fair sponsored by the Science department. Over 30 projects qualified for the City Fair.




Barry Quane shows the caution and care necessary in handling volatile liquids during a qualitative analysis experiment.



To verify a theory, Jim Callahan and Les Sobol uses ethyl alcohol and crystalized iodine to test living cell reaction.












#### Teachers Increase in Number, Change Text Books

Elementary Mathematical Analysis by Herberg and Bristol and the recent editions of the Modern School Mathematics for Geometry and Algebra 2 and Trigonometry were the three new text books introduced this year. As in previous years there were thirty seniors, who besides taking mathematical analysis, took college calculus, which was taught a double period three days a week by a professor from Fenger Junior College.

As any student would have told you homework was a vital part of his participation in class. Teachers felt that the students must be prepared to participate in class the next day. This was generally done by the students putting the problems on the blackboard. If any questions arose the teacher answered these, and then presented the next concept. Also to enhance the interests of senior students in higher mathematics, research papers were assigned to individual students who presented them to the class.

Three Mendel seniors Edward Hanley, James Hebda, and Brian Braglia entered the Loyola Mathematics contest. This contest was held at Loyola University last November for over 44 participating Catholic high schools from the Metropolitan Chicago and Northern Indiana area. Out of 132 participants, Brian Braglia captured a tenth place certificate.



# Additional Teachers Convey New Approaches

In keeping with contemporary teaching methods, the theology department has instituted new approaches intended to develop student thinking and probe questions asked by today's youth.

The department has gained several additional teachers who have enlivened their classes with new outlooks, a new spirit, and fresh ideas. Lecture topics for these classes were taken from the new text books, Youth in the Modern World and Man in the Modern World. The lively discussions following the lectures helped to deepen the student's understanding of his religion. Through the sharing of their own ideas and experiences, the students became more aware of the importance of religious values in their every day lives.


Movies on contemporary topics were shown periodically to supplement classroom work and to stimulate student thought. The teachers provided worksheets for the students to record their reactions to the movies and to answer questions prepared by the department.

In addition to their regular class and homework assignments, the students were required to do several outside readings, to express their ideas through various art forms such as posters and collages, and to participate personally in the liturgy by developing the themes for their monthly class Masses.



Mr. Heersema, Chairman of the Technical Drawing department, set the year's goal as: to improve work production without diminishing quality. He felt that the installation of ink washes, the use of ink for the first time, and a new text book, Architectural Drafting and Design, by Ernest Weidhaas, were major factors towards achieving this goal.

Magazines such as House and Home, and Professional Builder, used by Mr. Heersema and the students, and a planned field trip to the John Hancock Center helped drawing students learn basic techniques.


Nick Rigoni received the third place award in the annual Illinois Institute of Technology Drafting Contest. There were 3,411 plates entries.



Utilizing the skills attained by long and hard practice, Ricky Rozema beings to pencil out his assignment, Floor Plan.



# New Closed-Circuit TV Teaches Reading Course


Appointed head of the English department last August, Mrs. Sise implemented a program which used the newly installed closed-circuit television. Lectures in the rapid reading course were transmitted into the class room by means of tapes played in the recording room. Lectures were heard twice weekly for a period of twelve weeks to improve student's reading skills.

Special lectures in grammar and literature heard over television stations were recorded and used in the classroom. Students also enjoyed taping their voices and then listening to themselves and evaluating their own speaking abilities.

A journalism course was added to the curriculum as a special elective for the upperclassmen. Taught by Mr. Wojciechowski, the class covered all areas of mass media, and the students gained practical experience by working for the school newspaper, The Mendelian.







# German III, French IV Become New Offerings

Advanced classes of German III and French IV were added to the language department, while Latin I was dropped because of disinterest and poor enrollment. The goal of the department was to initiate gradually a four year program in each language.

To aid the students in their studies, new books, Im Wandel Der Jahre, Vivir Y Concocer, and ALM French Level One, replaced the outdated ones. The use of language tapes and recorders assisted the teachers in precipitating informal classroom conversation and dialogue while learning the necessary grammar and vocabulary.

Grammar was assigned each day as homework and discussed the following day in class. Not only did this enable the students to learn the practical use of the language, but also helped them to understand the English language.

Outside of the classroom activity, there were occasional plays and movies to view and various field trips to visit museums in the Chicagoland area,

To help the students in their study and pronunciation of Spanish, Mr. Sola has the class recite Spanish passages for him.

## New Afro-American Unit Expands History Courses


Building upon the aims of creating a Liberal Arts program, an Afro-American History unit was added to courses of United States History and World Problems. The department's curriculum also included an accelerated course in European History as well as special topics of an ethnic nature in other courses.

As an aid to the students, the teachers utilized new maps, filmstrips, reference books and the magazines such as Journal of Modern History and Journal of Foreign Affairs to make the social studies courses more interesting.

Seminar procedures, college-level paperback reading progarm, and political speakers have helped the students to develop a greater sense of civic and political awareness. Such techniques were employed in the World Problems and U. S. History courses.

One of the speakers was an elected candidate for the Illinois Constitution convention. Ted Borek explained to the students the importance and the effect that the Constitution and the Convention would have upon every citizen of the State of Illinois.


# Fr. Kret Teaches Key-Punch Course in Evening

Adults of Roseland and neighboring communities enrolled in an evening course in Key-Punch Operation which was taught each semester by Fr. John Kret, Chairman of the Data Processing department. Keypunch operation was also taught to the fifty-five Mendel students, who have been learning the principles of data processing. On account of the increased enrollment and the desire of the students to learn to operate various machines, four additional key-punches were obtained to supplement Mendel's equipment.

A new textbook, **Automated Office Practice** by Wandous has provided a better approach to data processing; therefore demands of time and study upon the students were greater.

Once the student has grasped the theory of information processing, he then learns the operation of keypunches, sorters, and accounting machines.

In addition to teaching, student schedules, report cards, tuition billing, information and other services were provided for the school.







# Record-Setting Defense, Offense Spark Play


In defense of their Catholic league and City Championships, the 1969 Monarchs compiled an impressive 7-2 record as repeat South Section champs.






Harry Kokolus, whose toe hit for 35 points during the season, scores a PAT against the Red Horde with Mike Babich holding.



Tim Sullivan looks for yardage in the Carmel game after his first quarter touchdown. Tim scored six season touchdowns.







Next on the line was Hales Franciscan and the South Section championship. Neither team could mount an offense and in the third quarter the score was still 0-0. The Spartans stopped a Monarch drive on fourth-and-goal from the one. But two plays later, defensive tackle Joe Mintefering recovered a Fertis Overton fumble in the endzone and we led 7-0. On the next set of downs, Mike O'Hare recovered a fumble on the Hales' 17, with Mike Hinsburger taking a Gill pass for the score. Final: Mendel 14, Hales 0.

### Monarchs Suffer Second Defeat in Title Game

The last regular season game was against St. Laurence and it was no contest. With the second and third string playing good part of the game, we rolled to an easy 36-12 victory and the right to face Brother Rice in the playoffs.

Observers of the high school football scene in Illinois felt at the beginning of the season that Mendel could quite likely repeat as champions of Chicago football in 1969. In fact, sports writers ranked Mendel No. 1 in the State for four weeks.

The Monarchs handily took the Crusaders by a score of 42-8 in the opening playoff. The individual play of the game came on a Pat Schreiber pass reception at the Rice 12 yard line. The pass was underthrown but without turning around, Schreiber arched his back, his momentum slowed him enough for the pass to land in his arms. Tom Burica's 42 yard T.D. run was a highlight. The opposition score was allowed late in the game by the reserve defense.

On Sunday, November 23, the showdown game was held between the Monarchs and the only team that had beaten them, the Loyola Ramblers. The Ramblers had taken the Monarch on the quagmire of Gately Stadium on Homecoming Sunday. The firm turf of Soldier's field promised to be a tough game.



Pat Sheahan, Ed Morrissey, and Pat Schreiber, all seasoned three year basketball veterans, handled most of the defensive duties, leaving the offensive chores to Lou Gray and Willis Nance. 




# Monarchs Lose 67-62 in Semifinal Game





































# Spring Festival Tops Year's Activities







The officers are: President Edward Janik, Vice President Michael Davenport, and Treasurer Michael Crowe. Fr. Gerald Nicholas is the Moderator.


When asked to comment on the progress made this year, President Edward Janik replied, "I feel this was a year of transition, a time of re-construction. We have laid a solid foundation for the future."

## Dinner-Dance Closes Membership Drive




Freshmen have a special task in Dimension '70—they must change and adapt themselves to their new environment.






### **JUNIORS**




Donald, born on December 4, 1952, graduated from Seven Holy Founders grammar school in Calumet Park.
