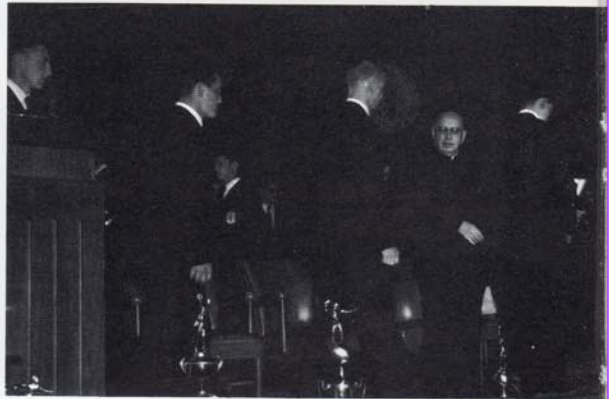

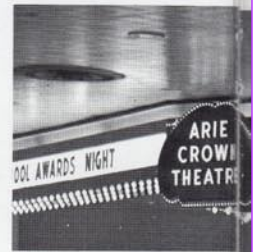

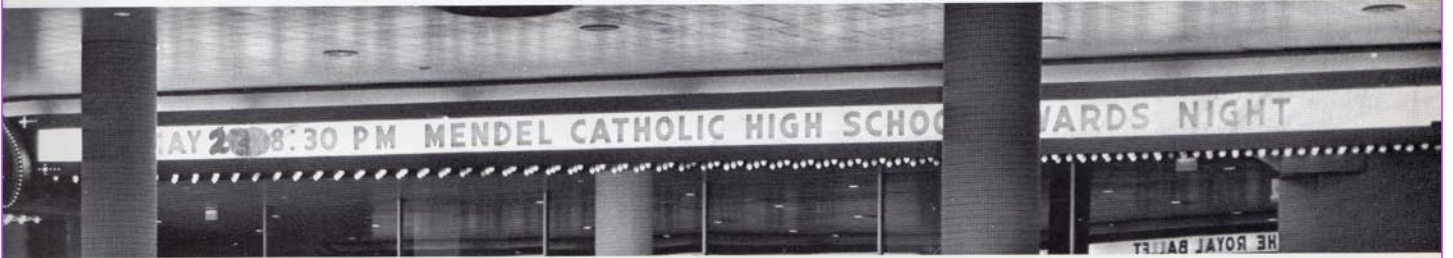

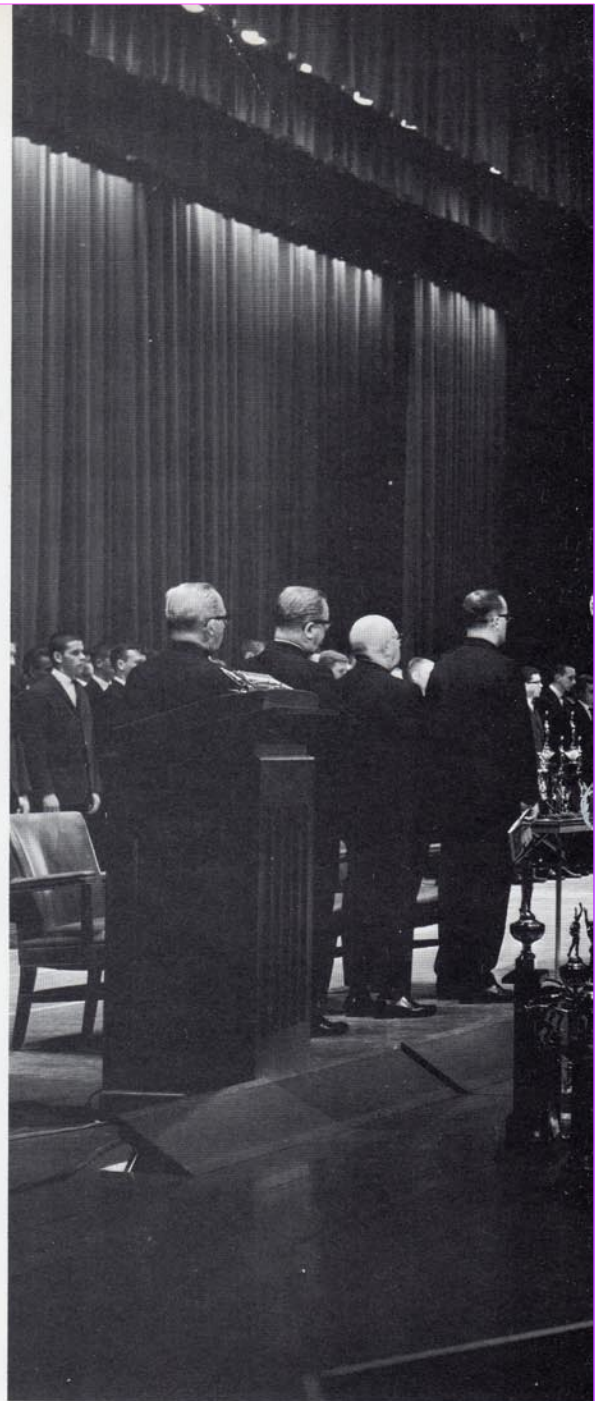
Dear Father McNabb:

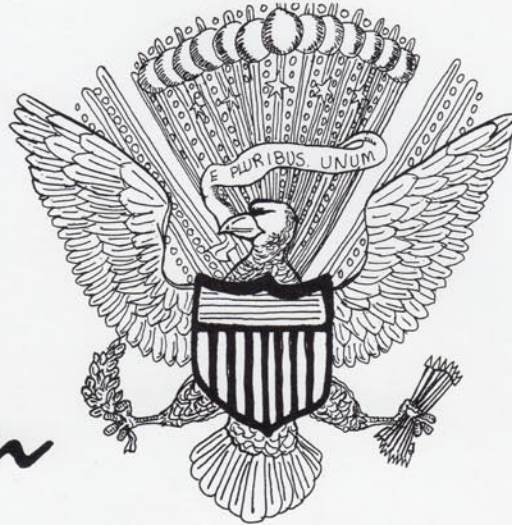

School Leadership Is Created by a Team of Six Administrators Who Set Achievement Goals.

The school program of Mendel is implemented by the activity of the vice-rectors working in conjunction with the principal as a council of assistant administrators. The coat-of-arms of the Prelate Nullius is significant in the heraldic devices represented on the shield. The eagle is the traditional symbol of his name-saint, John the Evangelist. The chevron with three crescents is the device for the Scotch family of McNabb. The roses are taken from the coat-of-arms of the Conway family of the prelate’s mother, and represent as well St. Rose of Lima, the patroness of South America and the Virgin Mary as the “Mystical Rose.” The upper quadrant attests membership in the Order of St. Augustine.

On the other half of the field are expressed allegiances and affiliations to the prelature itself. The colors of the three partitions derive from the Peruvian flag. The upper quadrant contains a radiating sun for Chulucanas, referring to the warmth of the climate. The crossed keys and padlock form the Chi-Rho representing Christ and the titular of the cathedral, St. Raymond, whose renown lies in the ransoming of captives.

His Holiness, Pope Paul VI, honored the Augustinian Fathers of the Province of Our Mother of Good Counsel, by assigning to its care the newly created Prelature Nullius of Chulucanas, Peru, having an area of 13,000 kilometers and 300,000 inhabitants. Named as the first superior having the ordinary ecclesiastical jurisdiction equivalent to a bishop in the prelature, is the Most Rev. Monsignor John C. McNabb, O.S.A.

Father McNabb was ordained a priest in Rockford, Illinois, by the late Bishop Boylan on May 24, 1942. Graduate work earned for him the degree of Master of Science in Library Science from Villanova University of 1954. His first priestly assignment was to Mendel Catholic High School and during his years at Mendel he had filled the position of Vice-Rector in charge of Student Activities and then Guidance Director. After graduate study at DePaul University, the Specialist Degree in Education was conferred on him in June of 1959.

As fourth Rector of Mendel, the faculty and student body rejoice with Father over the great dignity that has been bestowed upon him and through him on Mendel and the Augustinian Fathers. The same zestful energy and diligent concern with which he was known to keep Mendel among schools of high caliber, is now to be exercised in a higher call for the advancement of Christ’s Church on earth. Toward this end every Mendel man can and will want to lend his support and prayers for the mission in Peru.

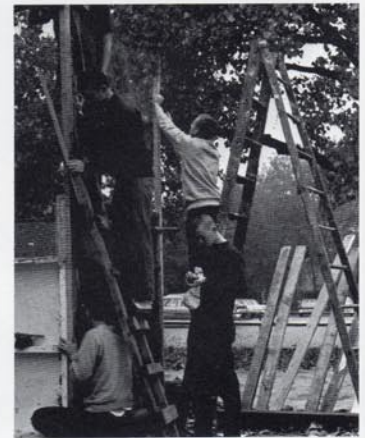

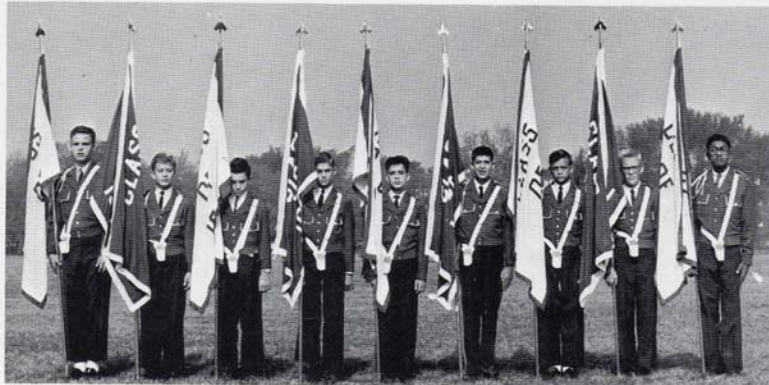

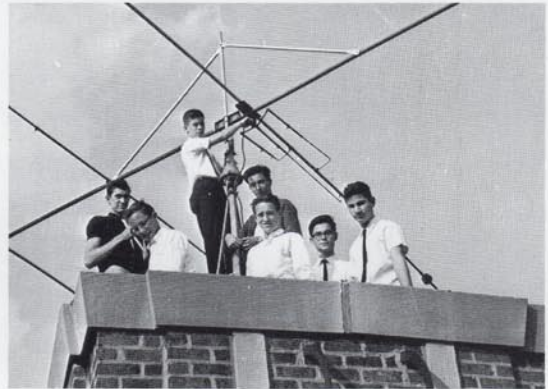
Mendel Radio Club

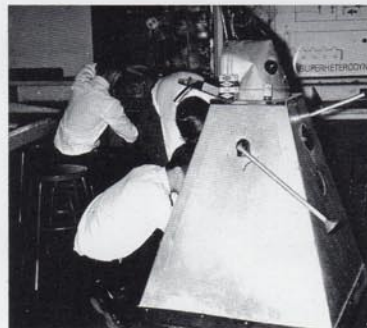

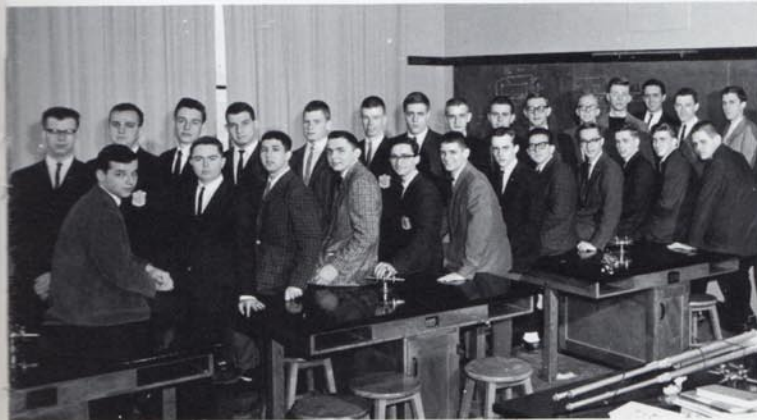
PHYSICS CLUB

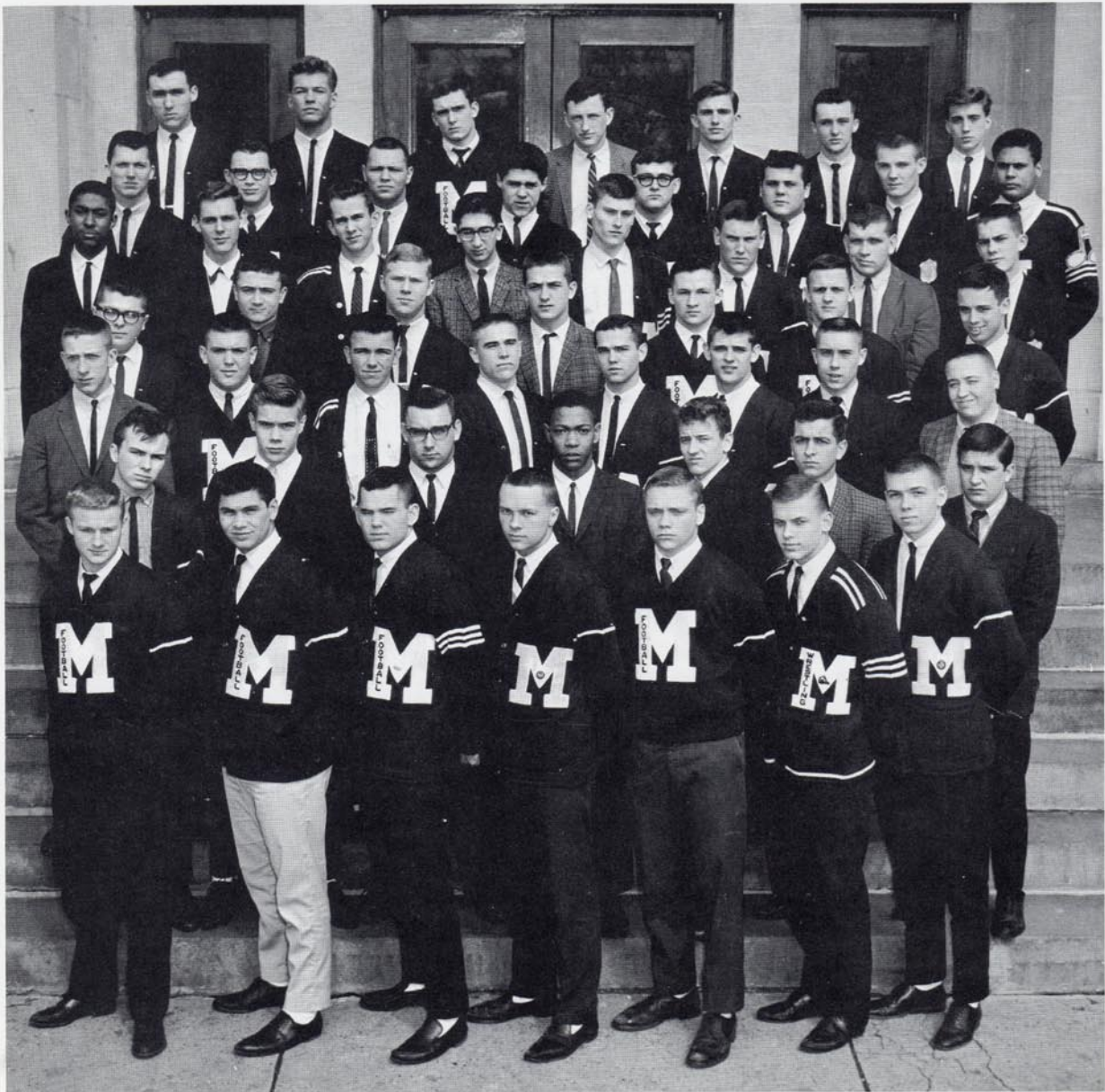

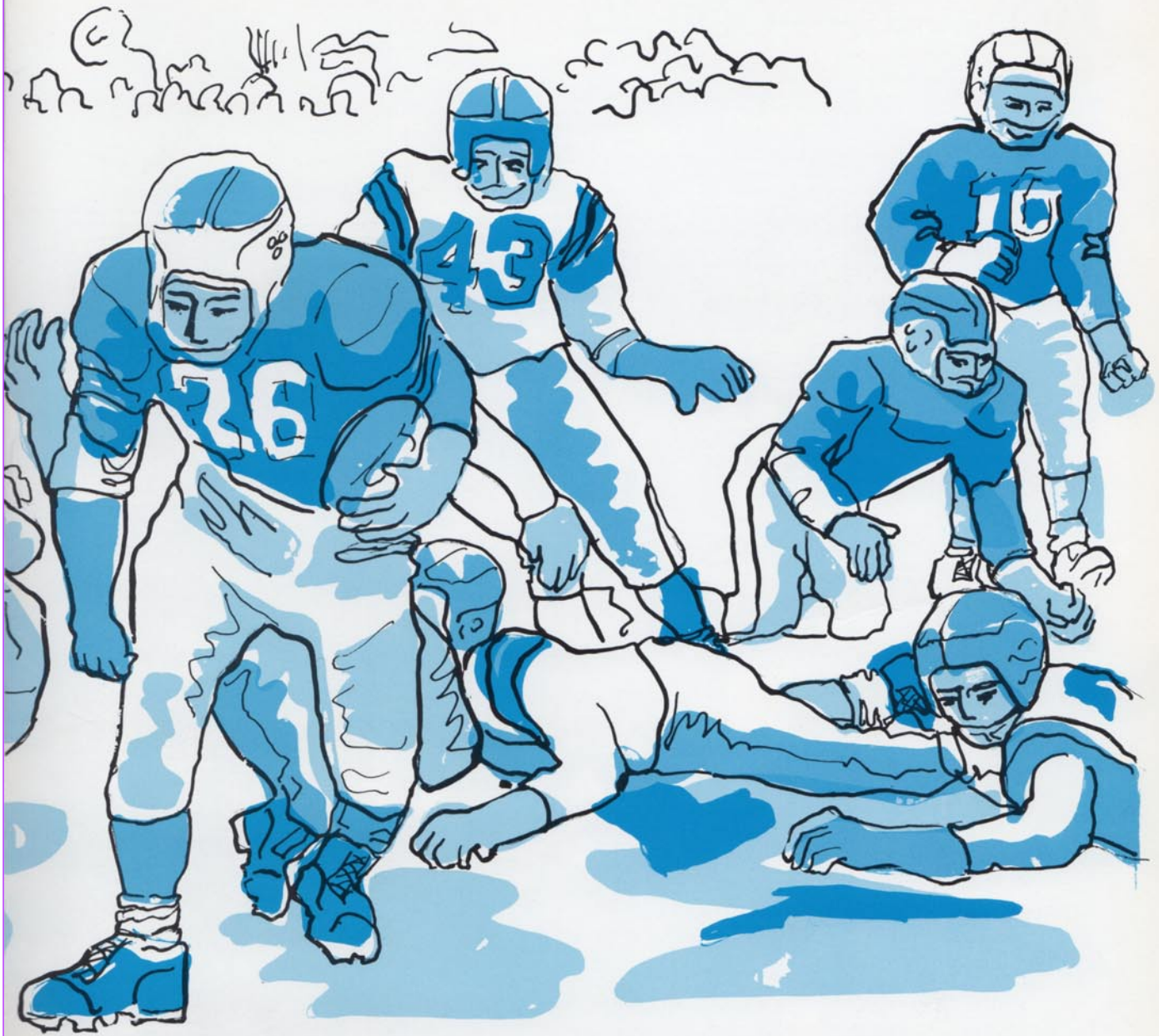

MONARCH FOOTBALL - 1963

GORDON: The season opened with a fine performance by a team that seemed to jell in front of your eyes. After yielding 60 yards on the ground to Gordon, Jarosky led a goal line stand. Mendel grew up, played nose to nose ball, and aided by Ormsby's running and Gornick's toe went on to win 21 to 6. A week later against Weber, Kreke and Crotty supplied the spark to a defensive unit that smothered a highly touted Weber offense.

ST. LAWRENCE: After Delisa and Olejnik combined to give Mendel two Quick TD's, a strong young team from St. Lawrence gave us all we wanted in our third night game. But Ryan and Macri led four goal line stands, while Cieslak took a short pass and galloped to a 97 yd. touchdown, Nelliger made five straight first downs to kill the clock in a spirited 18 to 8 contest.

FENWICK: A week later Mendel had it's finest hour of 1963 when the white suited Monarchs marched 80 yds. after the opening kickoff against Fenwick to an apparent touchdown, to all but one in Gately Stadium, the ref. However Heitzman and Thillman ran through big holes opened by Doyle, Clam Duffy and Sullivan. Ryan and Enright led a defensive unit that chased all over the field. An intercepted pass of Lambert to Hayes put Mendel down.

MT. CARMEL: A week later against Mt. Carmel, Mendel fumbled and lost the ball six times to the Caravan. Injuries mounted drastically and when the defensive secondary tried to operate without Enright, Kreke, Macellaio, Ormsby, Ryan and Munoz, it fell apart. Before Mendel found the handle on the ball, Mt. Carmel's passing attack had put three across: 21-6

HOLY TRINITY: A week later Trinity confused the favored Monarchs early by coming out in an unbalanced attack both ways. In the second half though, Mendel pushed out eight to nothing on Ormsby's fine 40 yd. run. But Trinity came back and tallied twice, once through our tackles and once aided by a tackle eligible to pass and to steal the game. 12-8

BROTHER RICE: The Crusaders out-manuevered the Monarchs to a tune of 42 points, in spite of the solid offensive play by Carik, Ormsby, Deasey, Munoz, Lewis, and a blocked punt of Manuzak. A jinxing fumble put the fix on our offense and the Monarchs crossed the last white line only twice.

ST. LEO: Tom Deasey opened the Leo game with a one handed catch, but Leo marched for two scores. Elenteny's toss to Doyle for a score was countered again by Leo. An all sophomore team featuring Leonard, Novak, Lis and Hogan played Leo for much of the fourth quarter only to falter on pass defense. The last minute try to tie ran out of time; it was Leo 24-16.

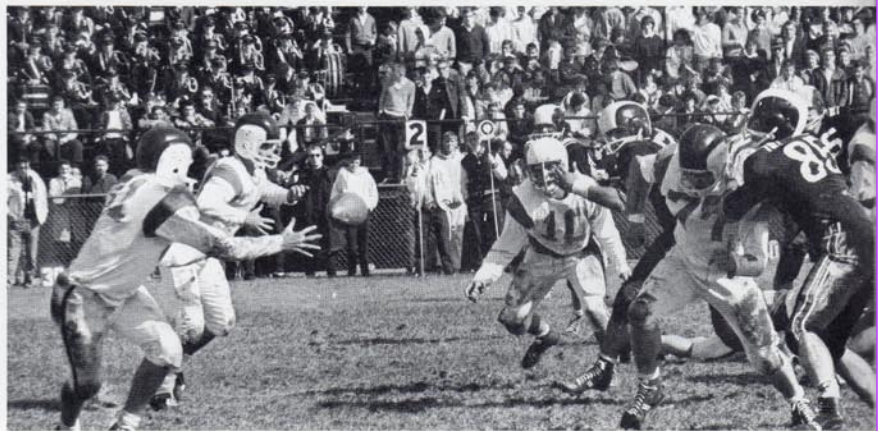

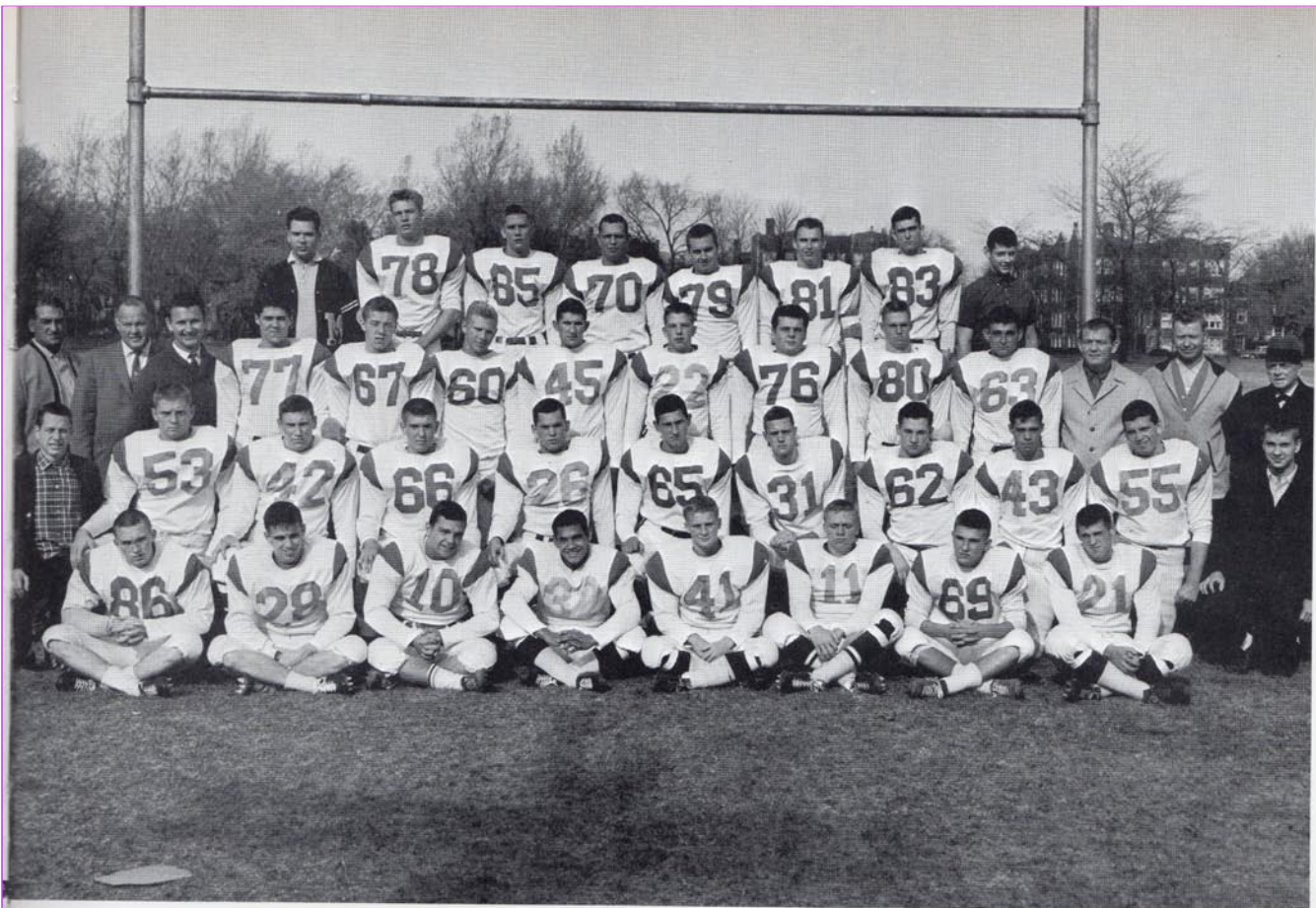

The Season in Brief

"Not as well as was expected" is Mendel's basketball story this year. The lightweights just missed a play-off berth with a 6 win-4 loss record, while for the heavies it was 3 wins-4 losses, but four of these could have gone either way.

(First Round)

St. Leo: It was Mendel and Guy Arvia all the way as the Monarch Lights piled up a 53-46 win. Even though Chip Barder and Dave Nolan hit at will, the heavies could not catch the lions, losing 62-53.

Brother Rice: Over at the rice-bowl next week the Lights could not get over a big first quarter deficit, losing 60-46. The Heavies never got up steam losing 64-46. But Mike Lewis hooped in 10 points for the Monarchs.

St. Rita: It was a thrilling double-overtime victory in which Art Flanagan scored the winning basket. In the 53-46 decision, Dwight Calhoun patrolled both back-boards, holding St. Rita's Wardell William's to one rebound while grabbing off 26 himself. In a stiff fourth quarter rally, the Monarchs narrowed a 16 point lead to one, but broke with Hank Suerth's fouling out, 65-60. Pat Ormsby put in 18 points and Suerth 17.

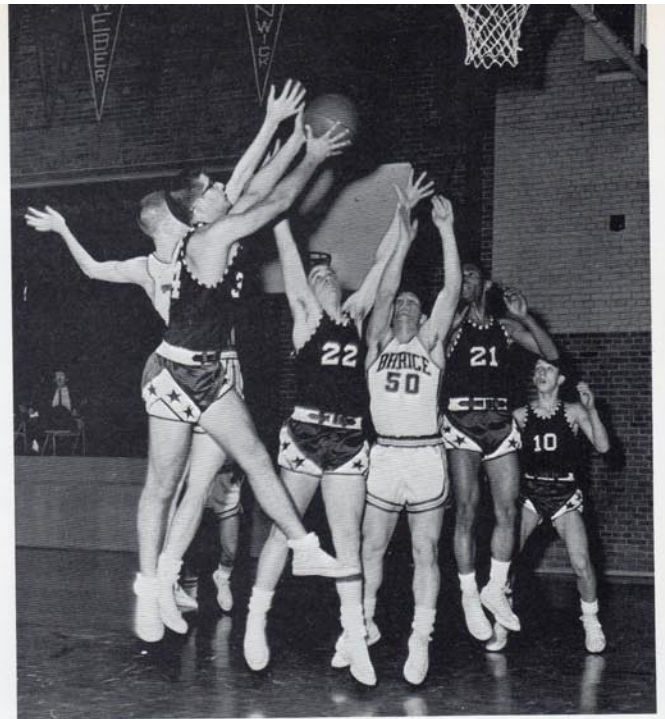
St. Laurence: Against an all junior St. Laurence squad, our Lights maintained a 20 point lead throughout. Duffy Hansen's rugged rebounding helped Mendel keep that edge. Our Heavies, too, succeeded, 71-43. Dave Nolan himself accounted for 15 points.

Mt. Carmel: Play was even for three quarters until Wayne Vuskov got deadly from all over, aiding in basket after basket. Mendel won 63-54. The Heavies' game was hopeful until Henry Suerth fouled out three minutes from the end. Even with Monarchs scoring double figures, Mendel still lost 69-65: Lewis had 16, Ormsby 15, Suerth 12, Nolan and Urich 11.

(Second Round)

St. Leo: The Mendel Lights demoralized Leo 59-31 with Calhoun hitting 18 and Arvia 12. The Heavies' second league win was against the Lions, 57-49. Nolan dropped in 18, Suerth 17, and Lewis 11.

Brother Rice: Even with Dwight Calhoun pulling down 23 rebounds and scoring 15 points, the Rice-men edged us 54-47. The Heavies were slimly ahead by one with twelve short seconds left when a lonely Rice lay-up went in. Mendel was in possession for two seconds and Suerth's desperation shot went in, but didn't count. The refs ruled time had run out: 53-52.

St. Rita: Plagued by foul trouble Mendel kept St. Rita's Lights on the free-throw line, losing 74-56. Len Modjeski was high man this time with 17 points. The height of St. Rita's Heavies accounted for the difference in that game: 70-59. Kevin Urich and Mike Hogan led the Monarchs that night.

St. Laurence: The Lights could have rocketed to a hundred points, but Coach Phelan substituted freely against a young Laurence squad, winning 80-48. Dave Weber and Art Flanagan paced the Monarchs this game. It was the same story with the Heavies as Bob Corbett scored 10 points to lead the Mendel victory: 70-44. The third and last.

Mt. Carmel: In a hot, hot game the Mendel Lights lost to Mt. Carmel: 64-57. Guy Arvia was leading the Monarchs with 19 points. In a rough, rough, Heavies contest, sparked with more than basketball, again frustration allied was the outcome: 73-51.

For Heavies Henry Suerth and Pat Ormsby the Mt. Carmel game ended bright Mendel basketball careers. Hank Suerth was the first Monarch ever to captain the team two years. His record of pulling down 1576 rebounds in three years time topped the level set at 1560 by Monarch Mike Stallings.

Pat Ormsby broke a scoring record, ending with 1209 points in four years of varsity play. He bettered a previous high of 1200 points by scoring 12 points in the Mt. Carmel season finale. But eight magnificent Monarchs steel themselves to pounce upon next season's prospects: Chip Barder, Jim Ciesiak, Jack Delaney, Mike Hogan, Tim Lamb, Mike Lewis, Rick Manuszak and Dave Nolan.

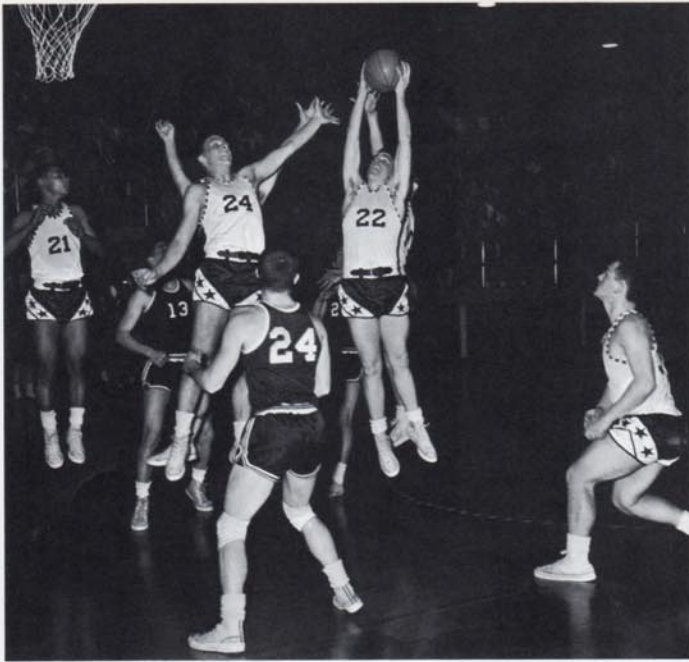

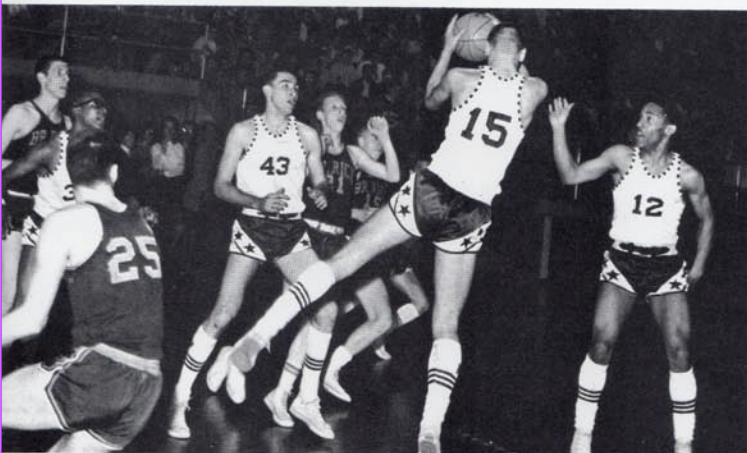

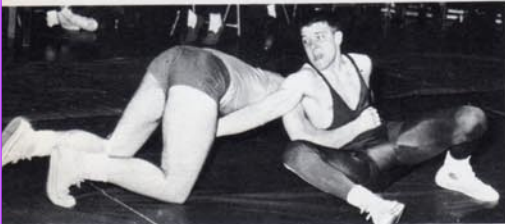

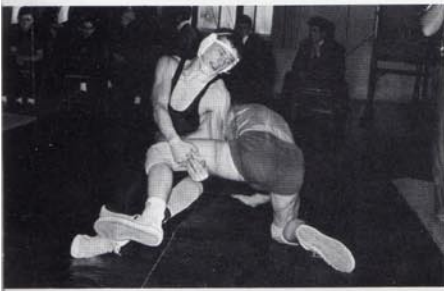

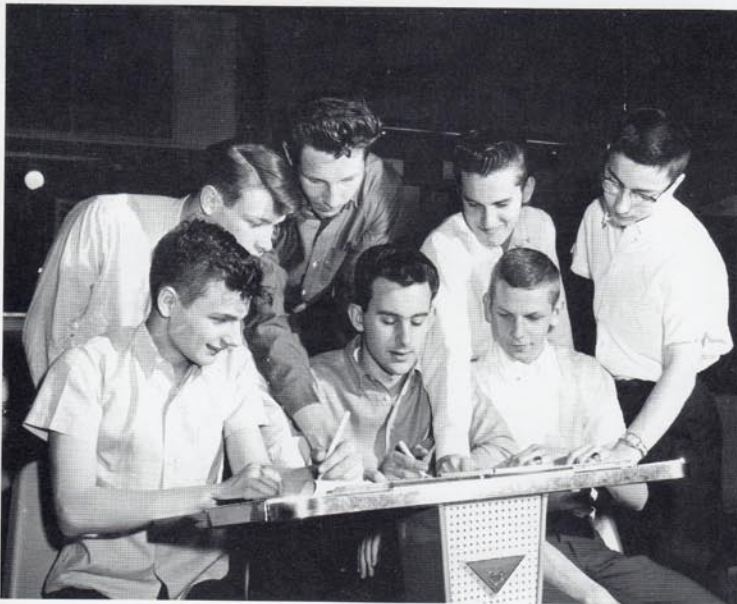
The City Championship Match

In the first game for the city championship Mendel's "A" team overcame Weber by a score of 836 to 782, thereby taking one point and having gained another point for total number of pins. In the second game the "A" team again beat Weber 898 to 865, thus winning their second team point and gaining as its total number of pins: 87. Jim Cullen's 212 game was helpful at this point. Weber came back to beat Mendel in the third game 929 to 831, giving Weber an eleven pin advantage at that point. But each team had two points, and Mendel's "B" team had only to win three points in order to secure the championship.

In the first game Mendel's "B" team narrowly won by two pins: 815—813. Weber won the second game and a team point by rolling up a fifteen pin advantage. But Mendel's keglers won the last game 823 to 799, thus winning their second and third team point and taking a nine pin advantage in the total number of pins. Larry Puch had won the first game by a bowler's dramatic dream ending: a strike in the tenth frame, and the third game by getting strikes in the ninth and tenth frames for a double.

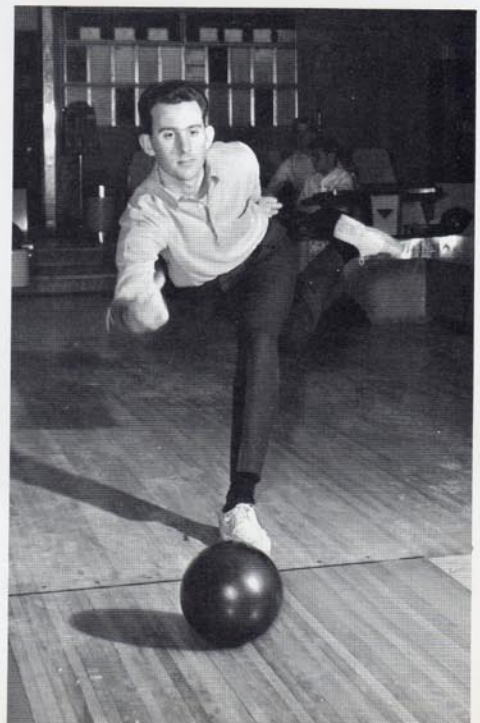

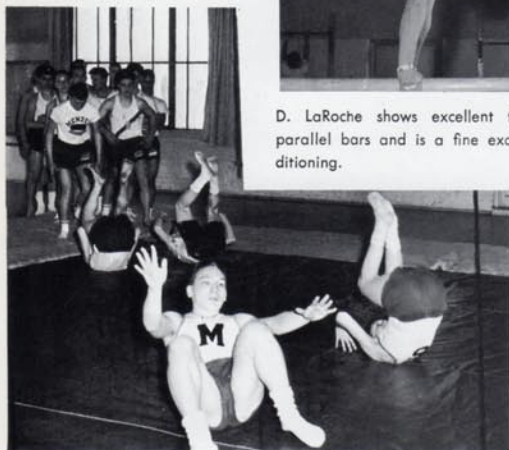

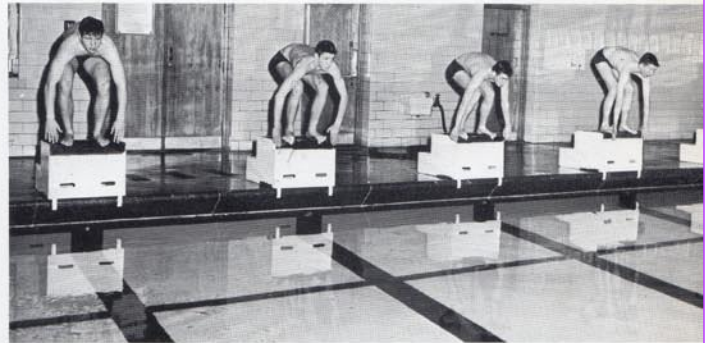

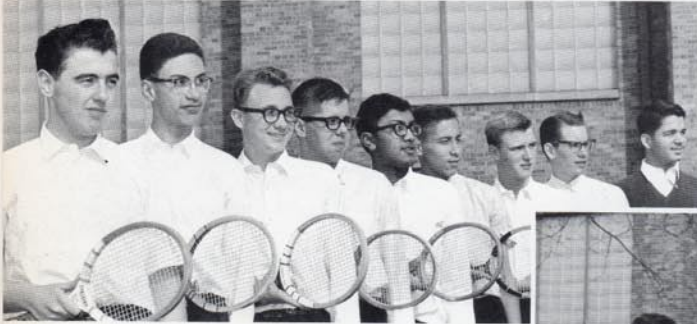

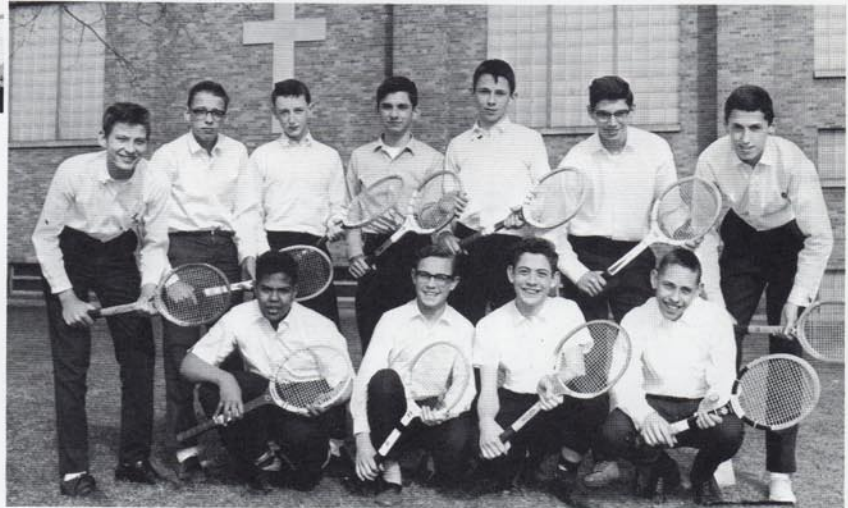

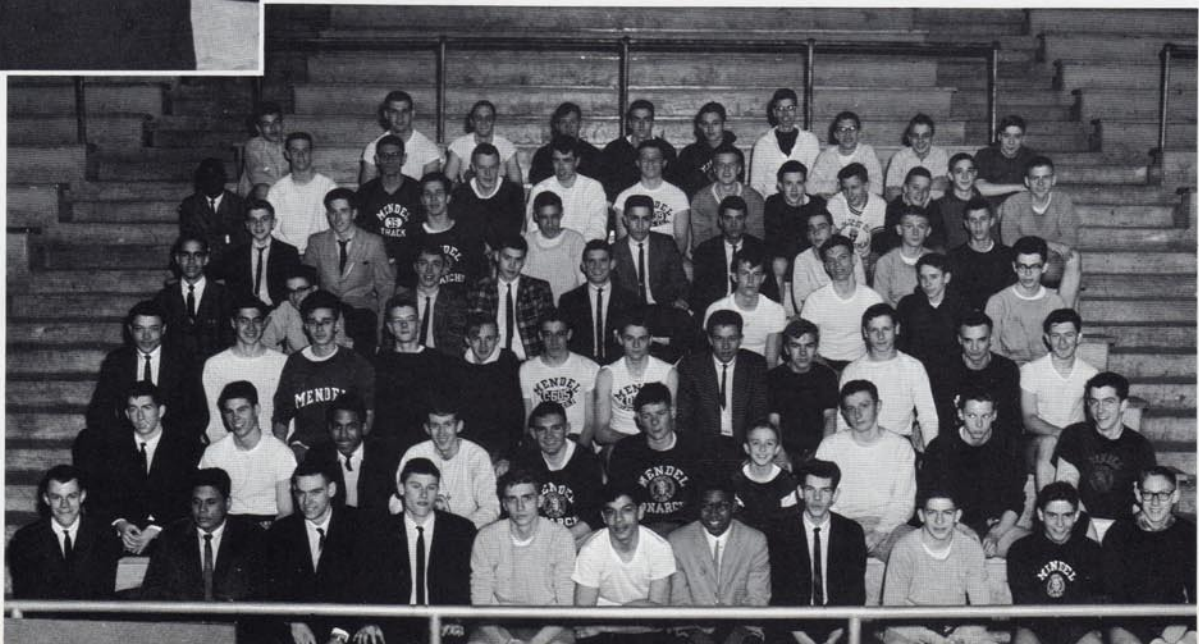

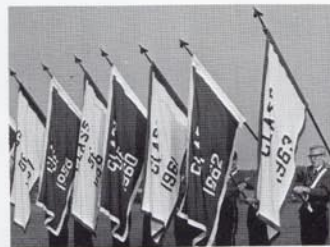

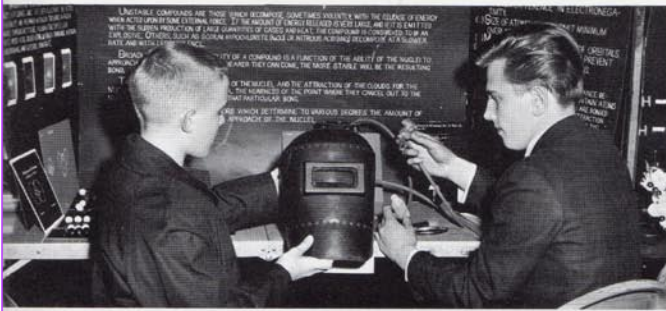

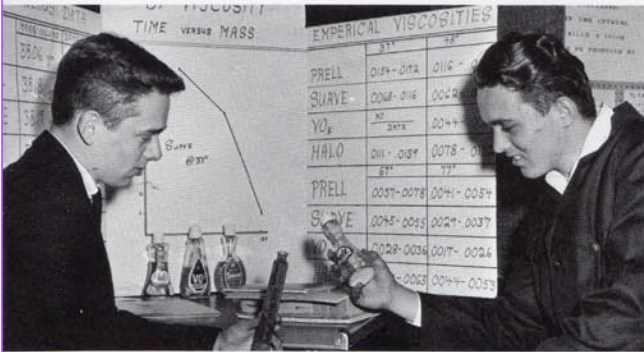

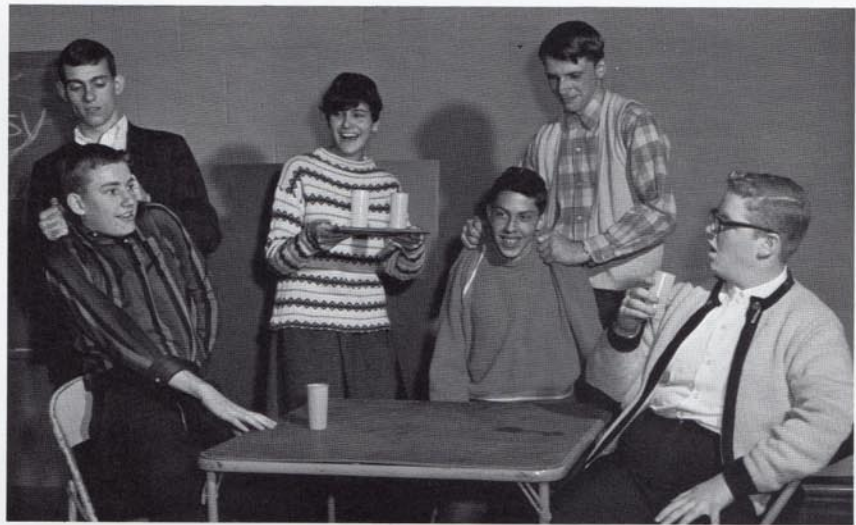
