## **Fr. Hartigan Continues Interest in Mendel**

## **Fr. Crawford Brings New Life to School**

With an enthusiastic and invigorating spirit, Father Francis Crawford, O.S.A., leads Mendel as he heads the Administration with the responsibility as the Principal. Behind his background in education, which is highlighted by a Master of Arts in Political Science at the Catholic University of America, and a Specialist in Education Degree from DePaul University, Fr. Crawford has brought excellence to Mendel. Prior to his reassignment here, he was Principal of St. Rita High School for six years. This is not, however, his first experience with Mendel as for a year in 1961 he was Vice-Principal in charge of studies. In coming to Mendel Fr. Crawford has brought with him a highly contagious spirit and love for the school, which will grow and expand in the years to come.





## New Administration Exemplifies Spirit, Dedication

A more congenial atmosphere at Mendel has been created this year by the Administration, who guided the student body in a meaningful direction towards their self-development. Both the administration and teachers have worked together to develop individual needs.

The administration, with its six Vice-Principals, is headed by the Principal, Fr. Francis Crawford. School policies are determined, proposals are voted upon, and school calendar, events, and activities are set at ad-

ministration meetings which are held twice weekly.

The Curriculum Seminar, made up of the department deans, is under the direction of the administration. It meets monthly to discuss, evaluate, and make recommendations on existing programs and problems.

As a whole the administration is an organization through which things are accomplished for the school, and it has exemplified the spirit, dedication, initiative, and perseverance which has been typical of this year.



**Fr. John Tyma, O.S.A.** supervises the program of studies and heads the Curriculum Council. As Director of Studies, he prepares student and teacher schedules, has the care of records and reports, and handles student registrations.



**Fr. John Peck, O.S.A.**, who is the school's Director of Discipline, insures good behavior for Mendel men. His office draws up rules and regulations of the school and determines suitable sanctions for violations of these rules.



**Fr. Ronald Turcich, O.S.A.**, plans and directs the school and social events. As Director of Activities, he prepares the monthly school calendar, conducts student assemblies, and announces the forthcoming programs and student activities.



**Fr. La Vern Flach, O.S.A.**, Guidance Director, coordinates guidance programs and watches student scholastic progress. His staff does educational and vocational counseling, provides information services, and conducts testing programs.



**Fr. John Molnar, O.S.A.**, Director of Religious Activities, provides a program of spiritual development for all students. This program is accomplished by chapel exercises, spiritual renewals, and classroom instruction and discussions.



**Fr. Thomas Nash, O.S.A.**, who is the Director of Athletics, coordinates all athletic activities and schedules. He implements physical education programs, and provides the opportunity to all for participation in intramural competition.

# Theology Teachers Add New Series of Textbooks

A new series of textbooks introduced is called **The Roots of Faith**. The series is a fresh and contemporary response to the challenge of Vatican II. It combines Sacred Scripture with Christian principles and places emphasis on practical concerns, truly reflecting the authentic spirit of the Council.

Classes this year were conducted on a discussion basis with the use of a tape recorder. Tapes of contemporary music and lectures started the classes. The participation of the students is essential to this new

approach in teaching.

The new Chapel Program allows one entire class to go to Mass once a month in a group. Sectional classes and their teachers planned the details. A field trip, the Junior Ecumenical Tour, took the juniors to a Jewish Synagogue, a Baptist Church and a Lutheran Church. The year's activities were rounded out by the showing of several movies dealing with contemporary social problems, a retreat in December for underclassmen, and a closed retreat for Seniors in March.



**Fr. John Molnar, O.S.A.**, in his second year here, teaches Theology I and III and Latin II. He has a M.A. degree in Theology and is Chairman of the Theology Department. He is also the school Chaplain and Vocational Director.



**Mr. William Keating** received his bachelor's degree of Philosophy from St. Mary of the Lake Seminary. He came here two years ago and is presently teaching Theology IV. He is taking psychology courses at Loyola University.



**Fr. Thomas Leo, O.S.A.**, who is a newcomer, teaches Theology II and III. He is the moderator of the Student Council, and conducts an evening course in Contemporary Moral Problems. His Master's is in Theology from Xavier.



**Fr. William Lyons**, who is an Associate Pastor of St. Joachim Church, teaches Theology IV. He has a Master of Arts degree from St. Mary of the Lake Seminary. He came to Mendel in 1956 and his chief interests are found in sports.

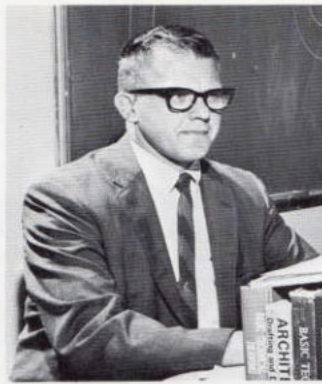

## New Projection Boxes Aid Drawing Students

Several preliminary drawing problems were solved this year by the use of two different projection boxes. These new pieces of equipment helped the students to visualize an object from various positions. Using their imagination, the students drew the necessary lines and curves, which correctly represent the object.

A new book, **Basic Technical Drawing**, which emphasizes the principles and skills of drawing, was used by the first year drawing students. It helped to fulfill the goals of the Department by improving the quality of the pupil's final product and by concentrating on techniques of proper line construction.

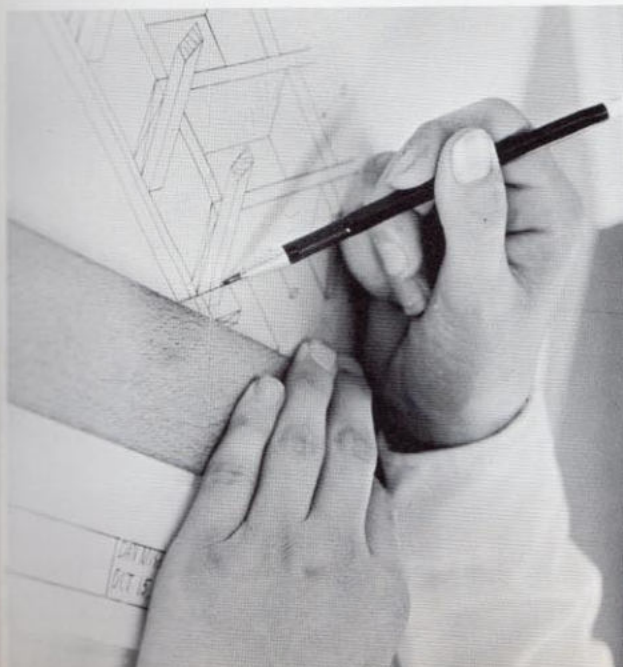
Next year, Chairman Mr. Heersema plans to offer a third year course, **Advanced Architectural Drawing**.

## Three Seniors Participate in Mathematics Contest

With the transfer of Fr Frederick Taggart to Austin High School in Detroit, Michigan, Fr La Vern Flach was named the new Chairman of the Mathematics Department. Fr. Flach has continued the department's policy of using the new textbooks, **School Mathematics Series**, introduced the previous year for the Freshman and Sophomore Honors classes. The other students used the **Modern Mathematics Series**, which is geared for students of average intelligence. In addition to the offering of Mathematical Analysis, twenty seniors take College Calculus taught during the first period by a professor from Fenger Junior College.

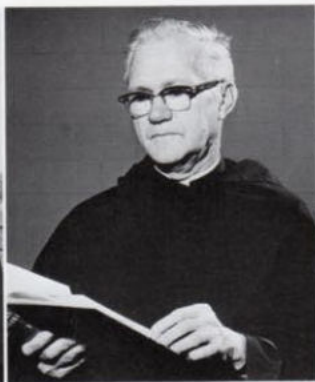
At one of their monthly meetings the teachers learned that classroom participation was the most

common and effective presentation technique. The teacher begins by explaining the concept until the class achieves a basic understanding. A number of problems are assigned for homework. The next day, the students put the problems on the blackboard and explain each step. The teacher, then points out any errors, makes suggestions for improvement, and if necessary, reviews the concept.

Last November, John Moskop, Robert Samoska, and John Kavalunas participated in a Mathematics Contest sponsored by Loyola University. John Moskop captured eleventh place among the participants from the Northern Illinois and Indiana Catholic high schools.

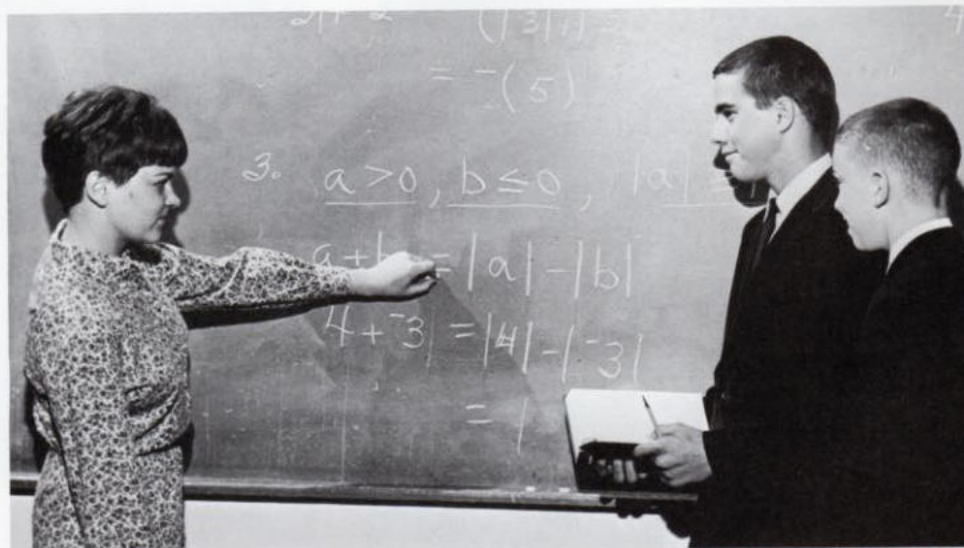

## English Teachers Begin New Programs, Clubs

The English department is in the midst of a program of curriculum revitalization, intended to make English relevant to all students, while utilizing the individual talents of an excellent staff.

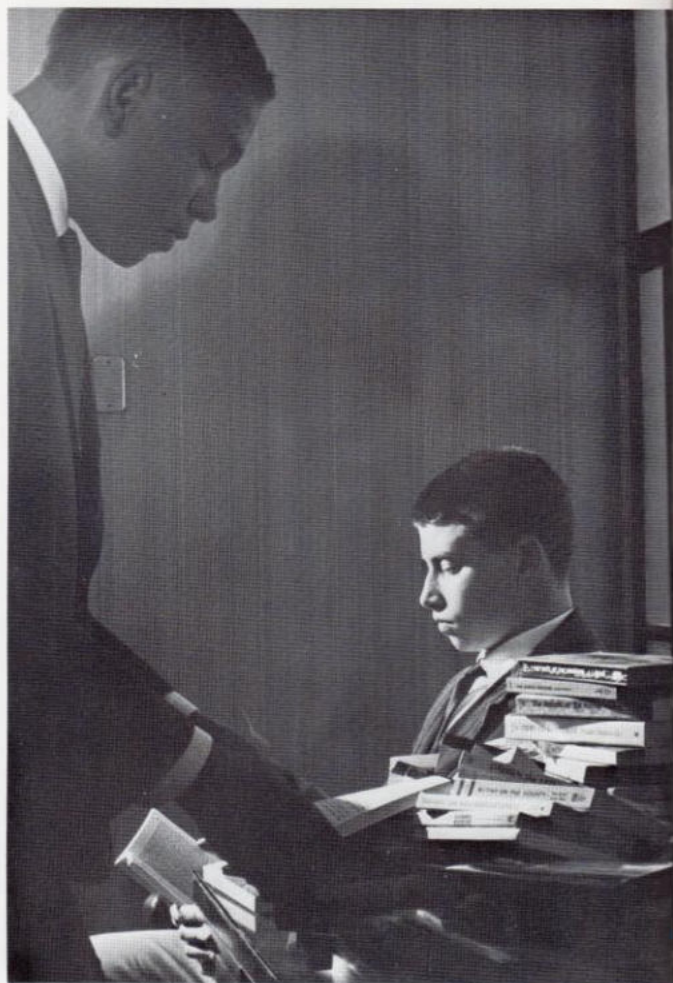
Believing that language is the key to knowledge, the department saw its responsibility to deal with the individual student in a two-step process of diagnosis and cure. This necessitated numerous additions to activities on both the curricular and extra-curricular levels, aimed at establishing vital programs for students of any level and providing outlets for the use of language.

Through well chosen textbooks, workbooks and magazines, the grammar stressed in first and second years, utilizes what is best in both the traditional and linguistic approaches to grammar.

A far-sighted inter-departmental "total remedial" program, stressing concept learning, intended to prepare the remedial student to handle all subject matter, was inaugurated under the leadership of the English department. This totally new program should be in "full swing next year.

In literature, curriculum changes have been made to offer challenges to each student. Here the emphasis has been on the needs of the extra-ordinary student in the area of literary theory.

On the extra-curricular level, a bi-annual literary magazine has been added to the ranks of school publications. Also instituted this year were a writing club and a reading club aimed at the student whose abilities are not challenged fully in the classroom.

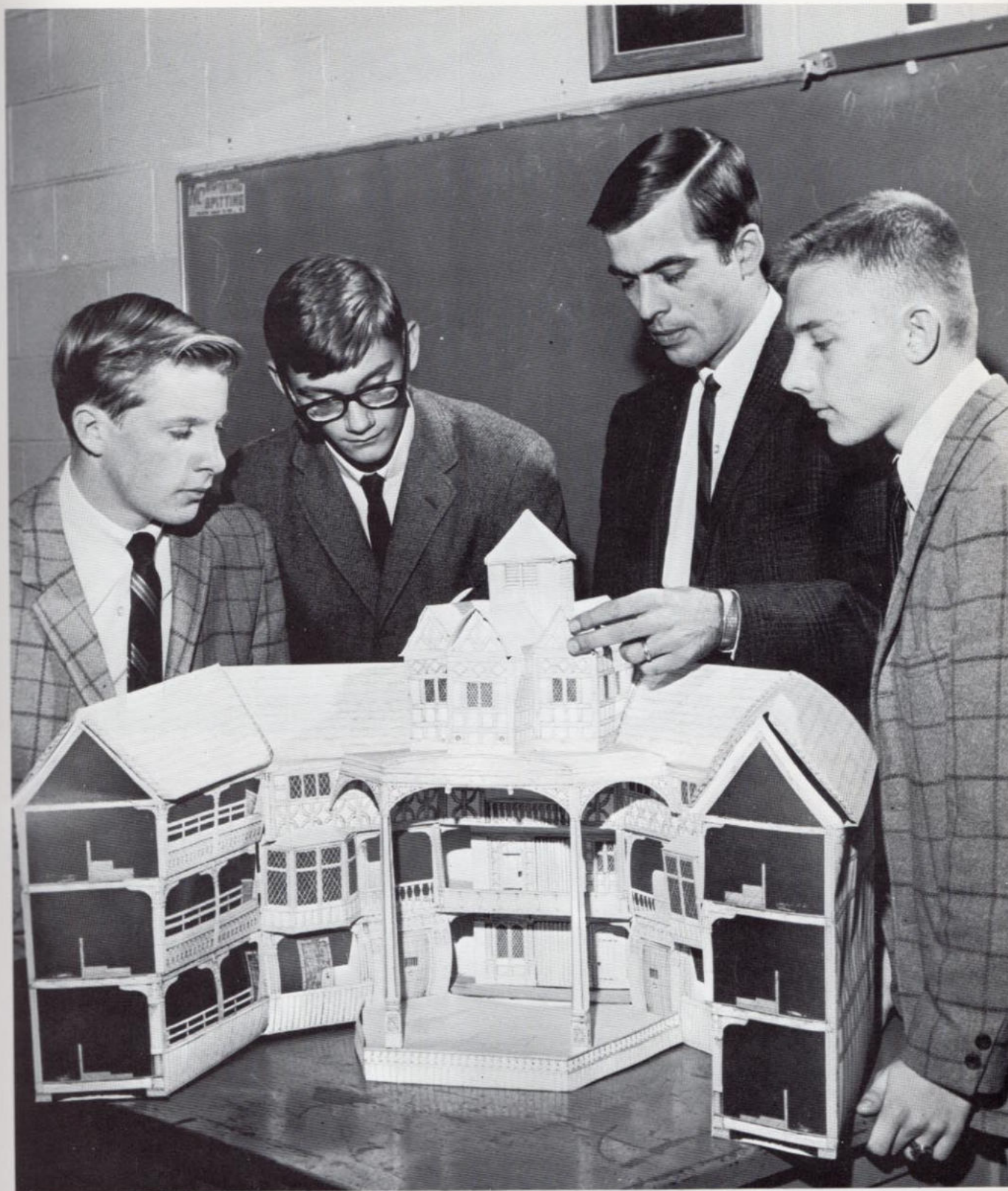

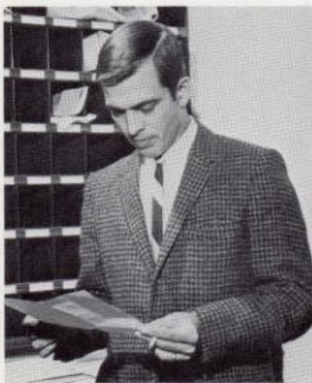
The Globe, a London theatre where Shakespearean productions were held, has always been a point of interest to the Seniors.

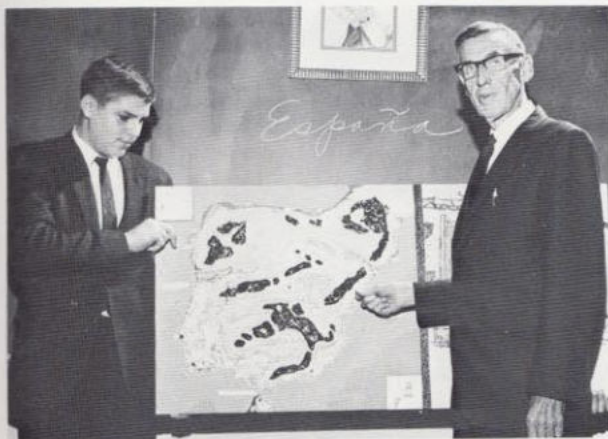

Communication, which is the basis of progress in any language, was strongly stressed this year.

The language department aimed towards closely uniting the direct and the indirect method of teaching the student. Thus this presented the language pupil with a solid foundation in hearing, speaking, reading and writing the foreign language.

Classes were conducted on a lecture discussion basis, utilizing as much dialogue as possible. Grammar was assigned each day as homework and discussed the following day in class. This not only enabled the student to learn the practical use of the language in everyday life, but also helped him to understand and appreciate the English language.

To supplement this method of teaching new books, **El Camino Real** by Jarrett & McManus, **First Book in German**, **French One**, and **French Two** have replaced the old to aid in the renewal of the language. In addition to the texts used in class students were also required to read a number of supplement readers.

The language program at Mendel consists of French, German, Spanish and Latin. This year's addition to the curriculum was Spanish IV and French III.

Since the Second Vatican Council, the interest to study Latin has been decreasing; however, a Latin II class was formed. The teacher has injected interest into class by promoting various projects, including the publishing of a quarterly called **The Victor**. This magazine features original poems, essays in Latin, research topics and cartoons.

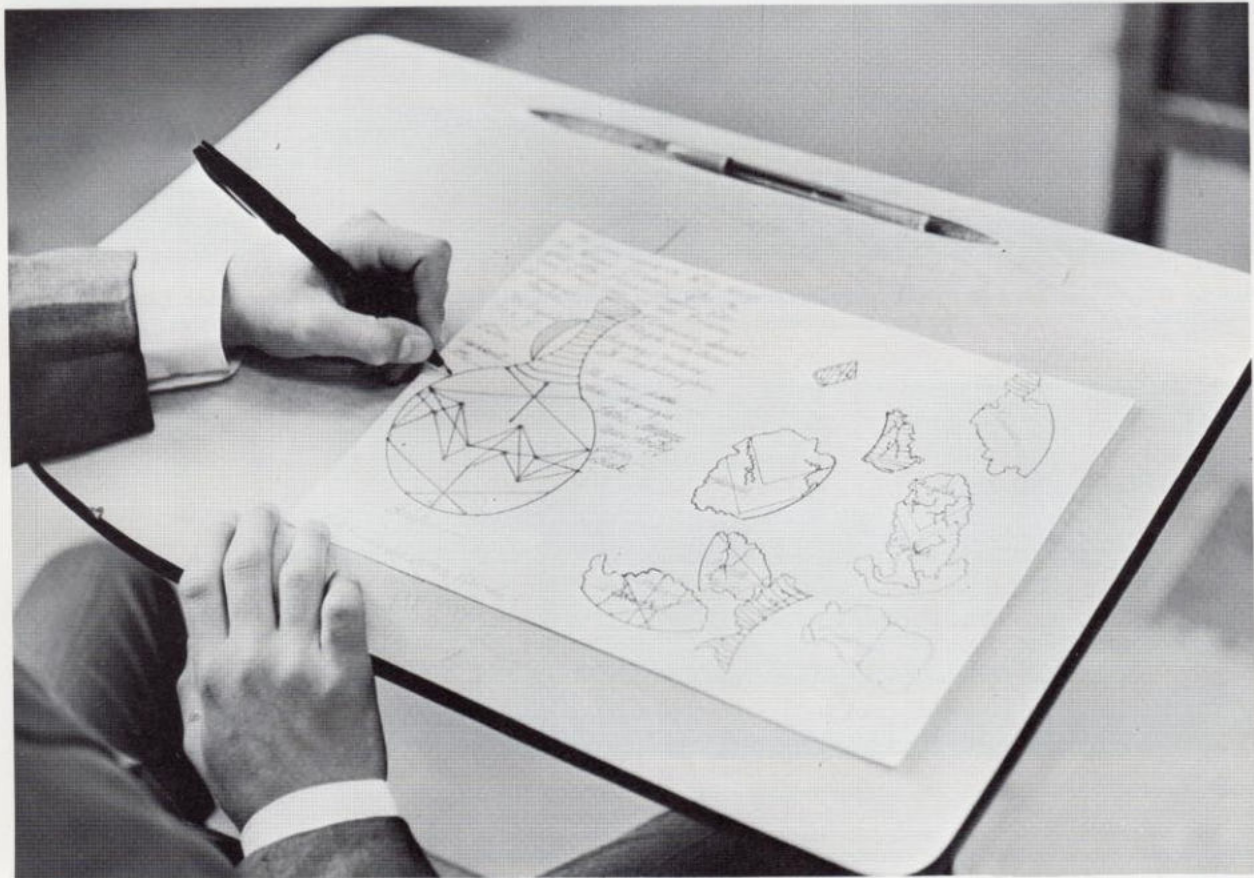

## Visual Aids Augment Various Science Curricula

To develop an appreciation for science through a better understanding of its principles on the part of all students is the objective of the Science Department. The courses included physics, chemistry, biology, and physical science. Each provided ample opportunity to acquaint the student with laboratory equipment and techniques to enable him to continue with proficiency in college. With five modern laboratories and a revised curriculum placing emphasis on inquiry and practical laboratory experience, the science student prepared himself to think independently and to adjust to a de-

manding college program.

Audio-visual aids included sixteen millimeter sound movies, overhead transparencies, film strips. These were used as a supplement to classroom lectures and laboratory experiments. Available to the student was a wealth of reference material consisting of various textbooks, published papers, and periodicals. To further the student's interest in science, a Science Fair was held in February and an active Science Club provided extra curricula and activities which included seminars and visits to local museums.



Fr. Erwin Dodge, O.S.A., who is the Head of the Science department, came to Mendel in 1961. Besides teaching Biology, he moderates the school's newspaper, Mendelian. In his spare time he enjoys music, skiing, and traveling.



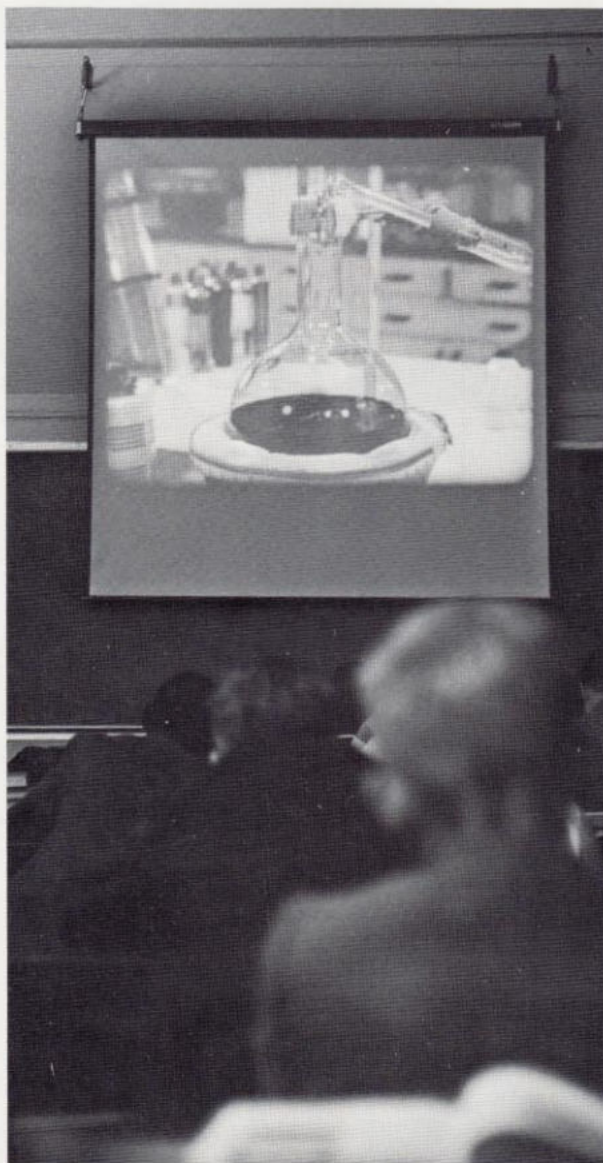

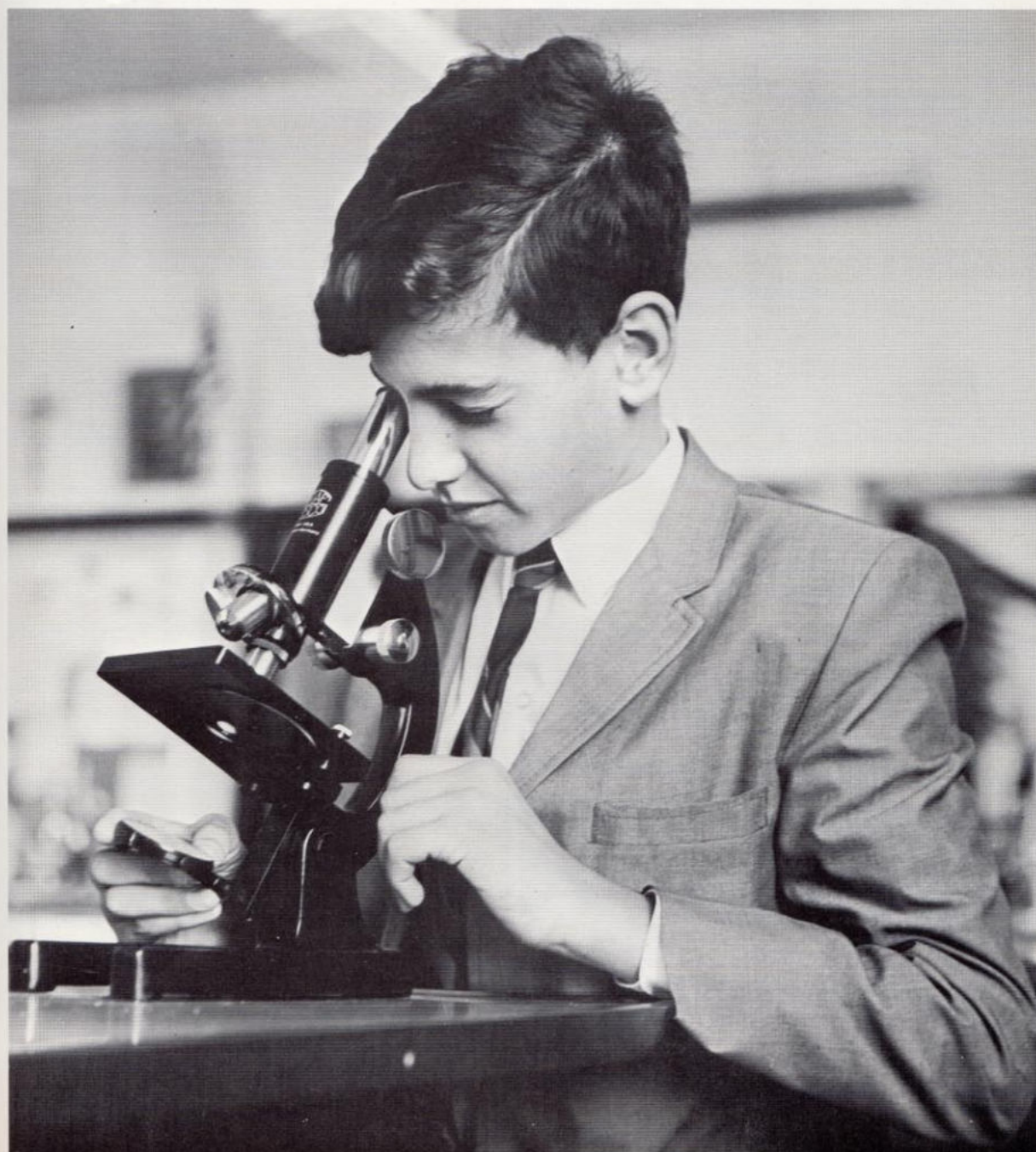

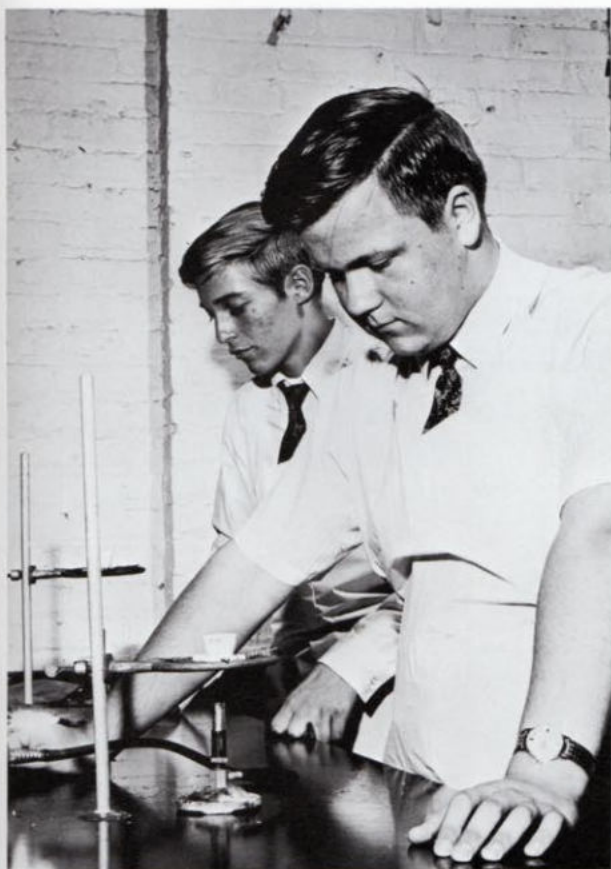

To standardize as far as possible the operation of the Department and to encourage the student to think were the principle objectives of Mr. Miccolis when he accepted the post as Social Studies Chairman. With these goals in mind, the Department has completed syllabi in all of its various courses, and has begun a program of standardized quarter and semester examinations.

Students found that the new slide projector, a complete series of American History slides, filmstrips in all subject areas, and a new series of Modern European History maps made their social studies courses more interesting and analytical.

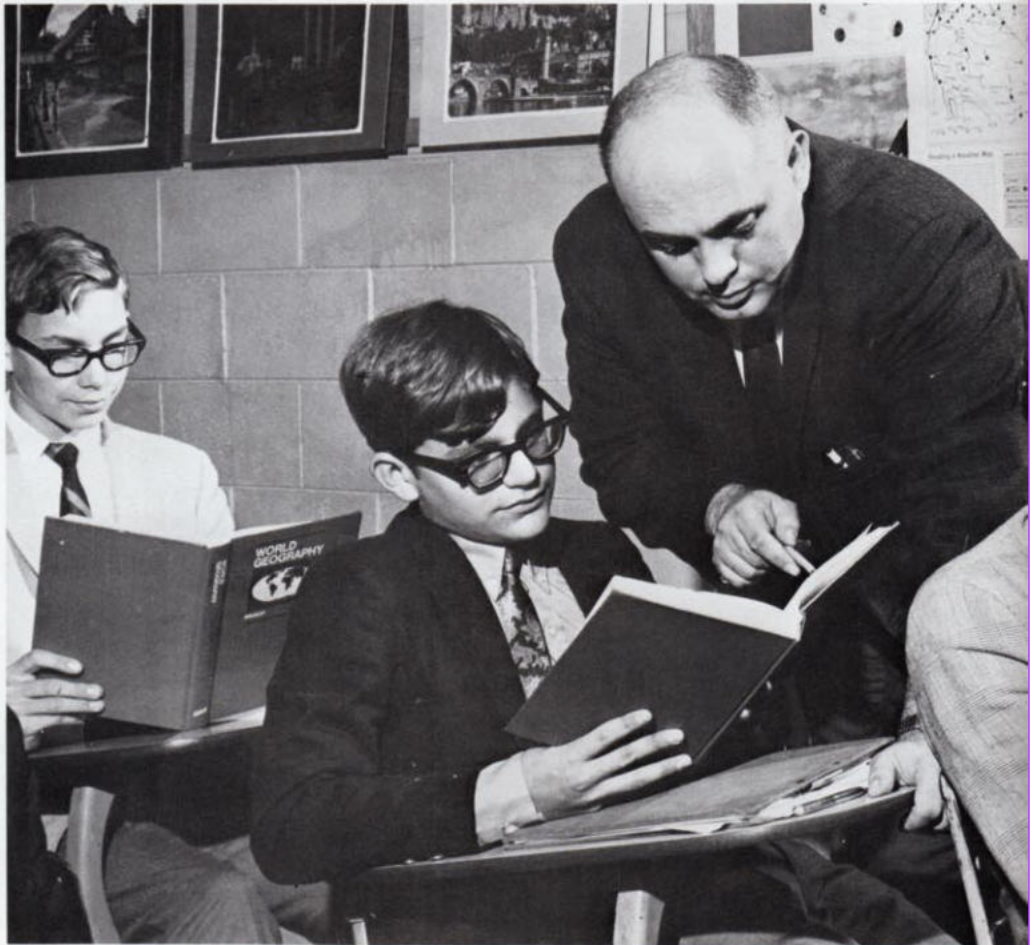

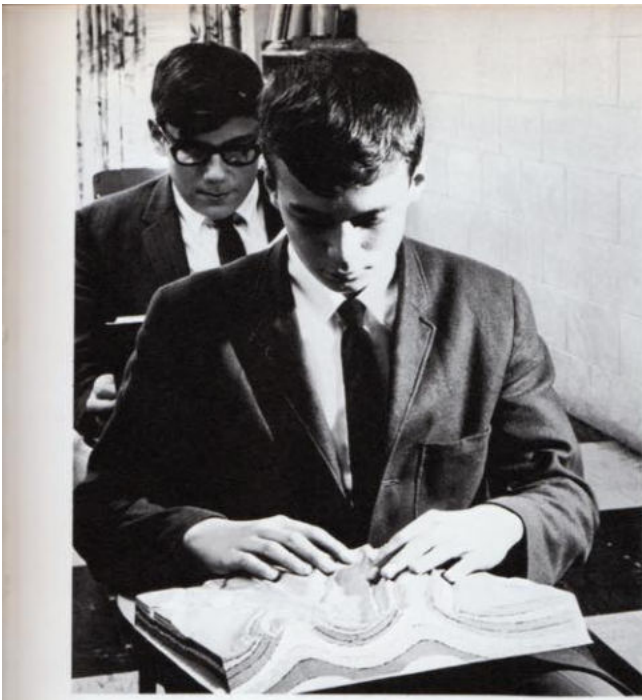

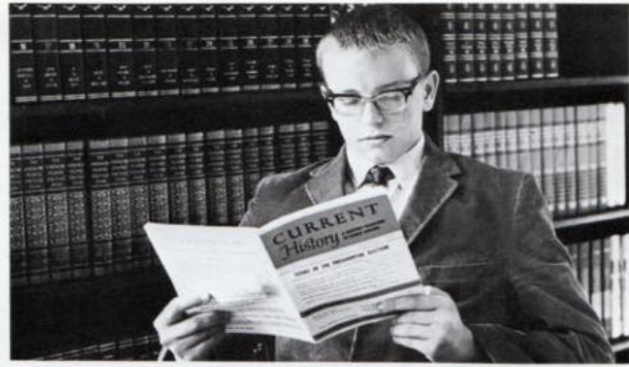

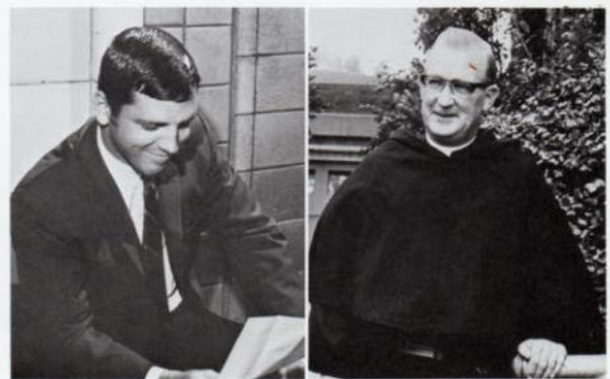

## Physical Education Students Participate in Varied Programs

An interesting and vigorous program has been drawn up by Mr. Diamond, the Physical Education Head. For the first fifteen minutes of each class, the students participated in a calisthenic program which consisted of different exercises. Then this period was followed by some indoor or outdoor sport. Beginning last February the calisthenic program was replaced by gymnastics, whereby participants exercised on trampolines, parallel bars, spring boards, and bucks.

Chairman, Fr. Ronald Turcich. In its place was taught Consumer Economics, which proved to be more attractive and beneficial to the students. Accounting, advertising, and typing were other courses offered by the Department. A number of magazine subscriptions and publications in these fields were purchased, and thereby aided the students in their research demanded by their teachers. Realizing both the importance of every individual and the competitive demands in the business world, the instructors concentrated on teaching principles, demonstrating techniques, and developing skills.

## School Benefits While Data Processing Pupils Learn Programming

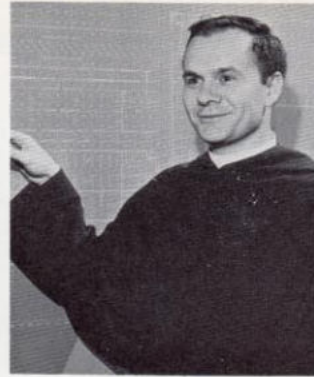
Since its inauguration several years ago, the Data Processing department, under the direction of Father Kret, has become a beneficial segment of Mendel's framework.

Besides providing the interested student with a basic knowledge of computer theory, a knowledge which in future years will provide him with the ability to obtain a well-paying job, the Department teaches all the necessary operations of a money-making institution, including a knowledge of book-keeping and processing of bills. After learning computer theory during the first semester of class, the student then receives a semester of training in wiring and physical operation of Mendel's own equipment. Included in the school's bank of machinery are two key-punch machines, a reproducer, two 402 accounting machines which do all the printing, one card sorter, and a collator.

The Department does the scheduling of students, prepares report cards, rosters, and tuition statements. The advantages of this service has increased the efficiency and accuracy of school operation, and minimized the cost of keeping school records.

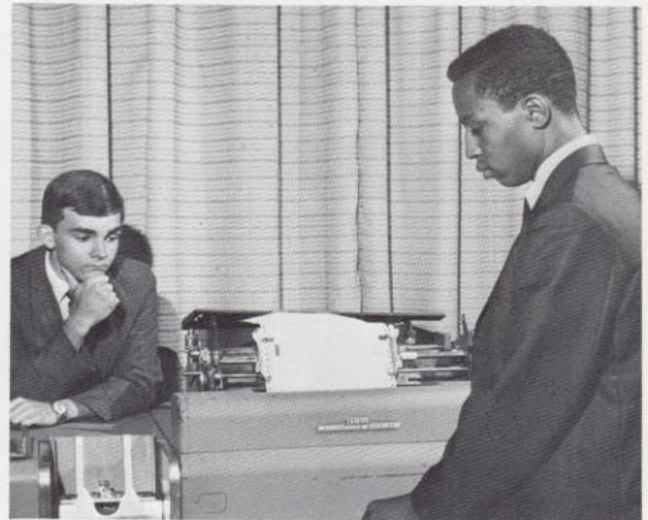

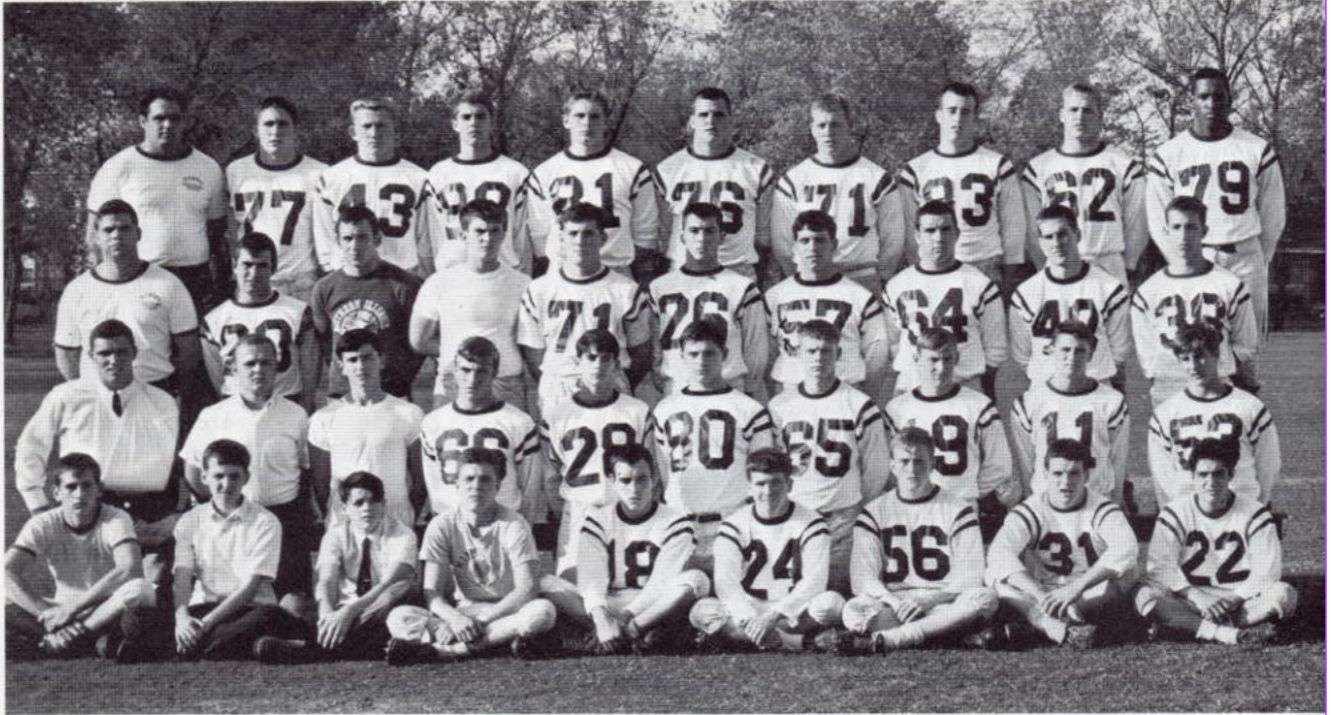
## Magnificent Mendel Monarchs Win Catholic, City Football Titles

In Mendel's first victory over Brother Rice, Carl Smolinski makes a good gain against the Crusader line.





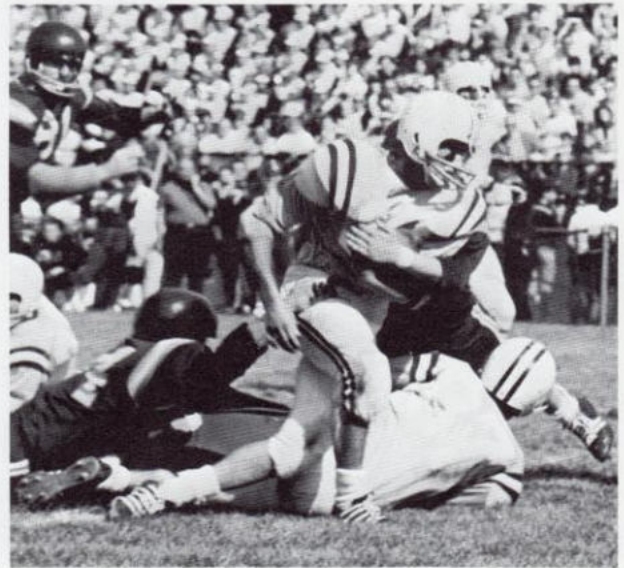

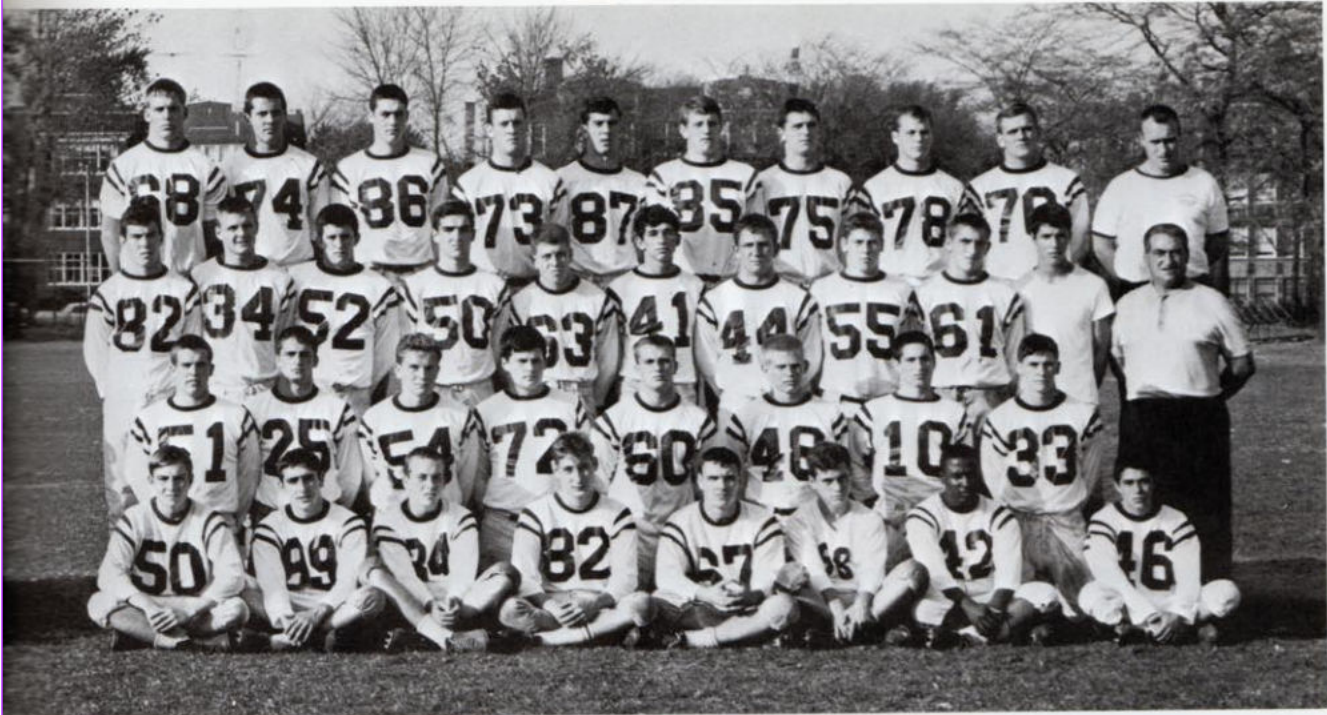

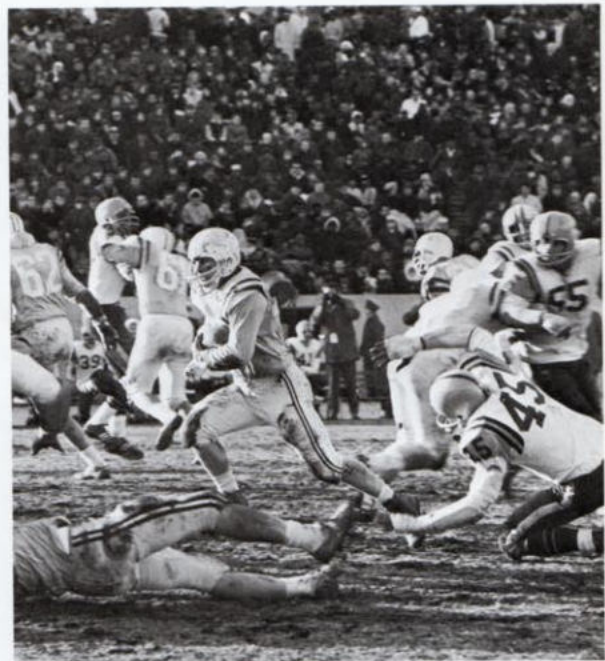

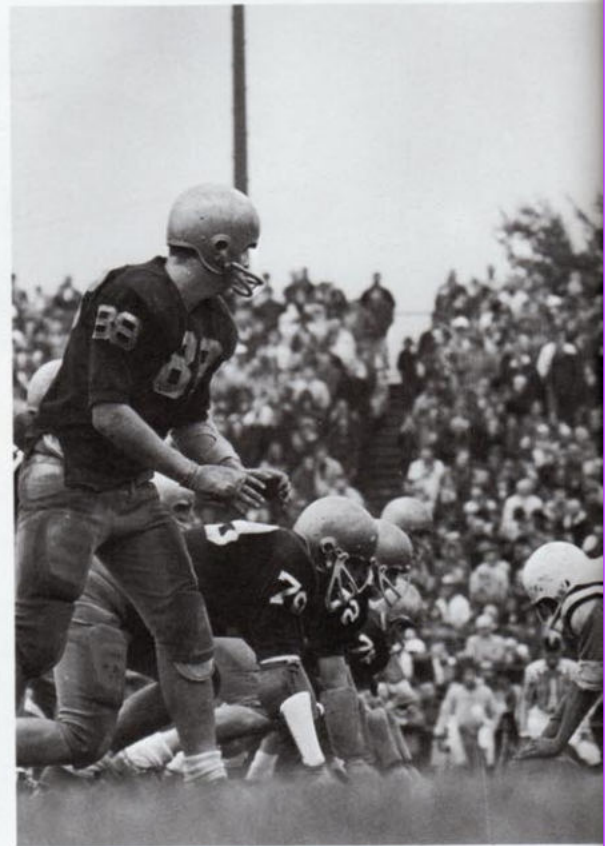

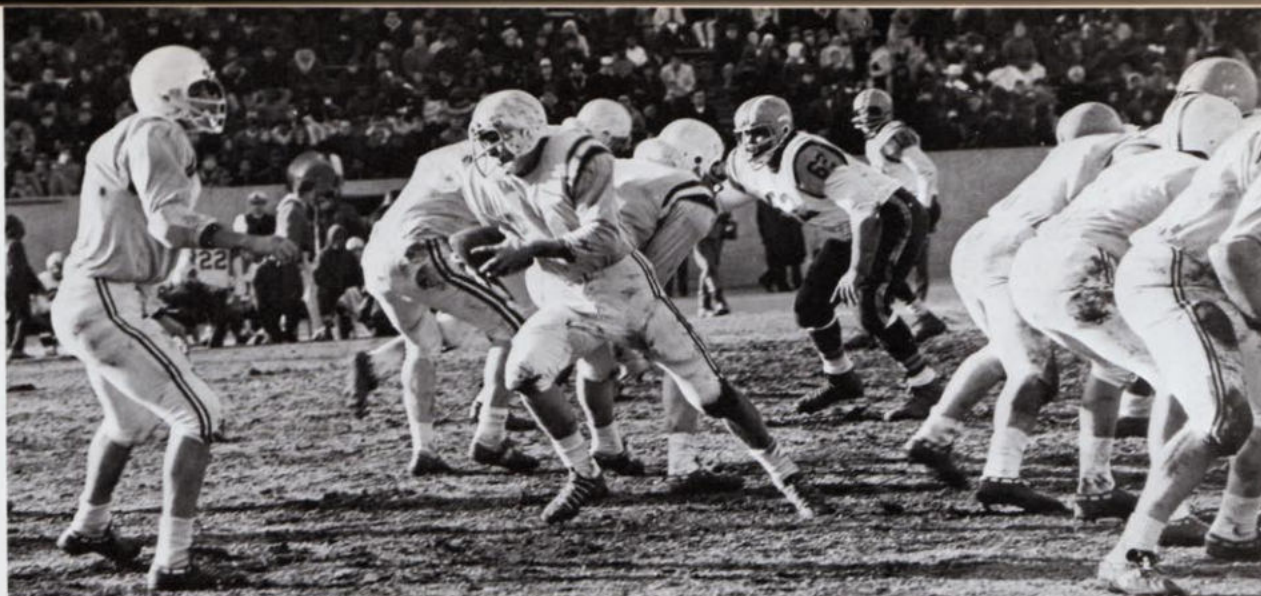

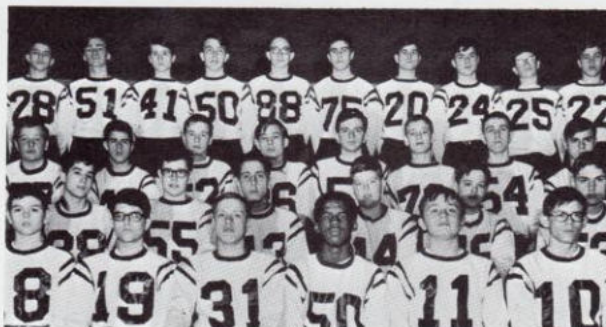
# Freshman Monarchs Post Football Record of 6-1-1

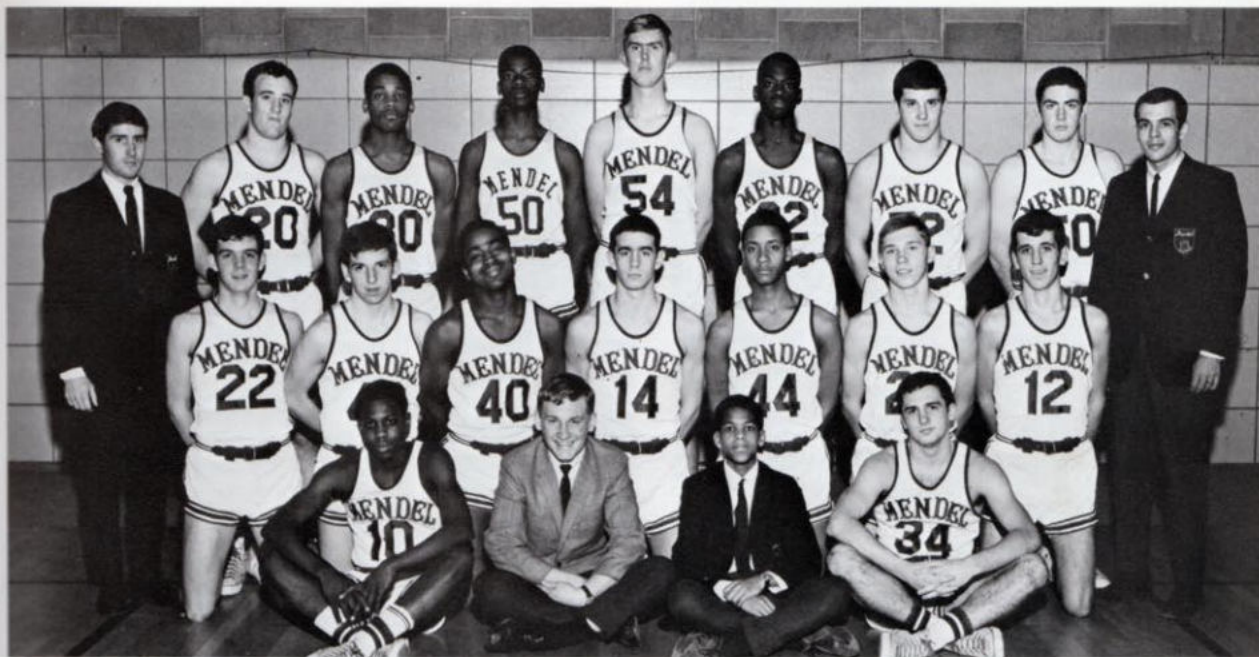

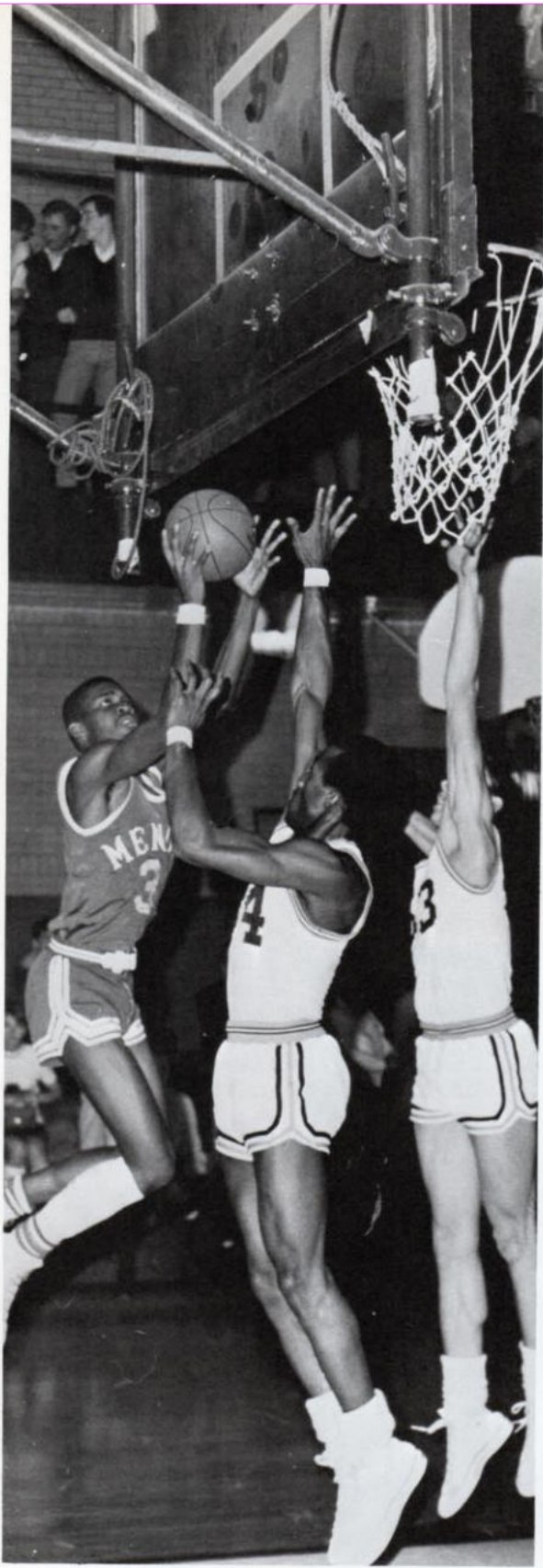

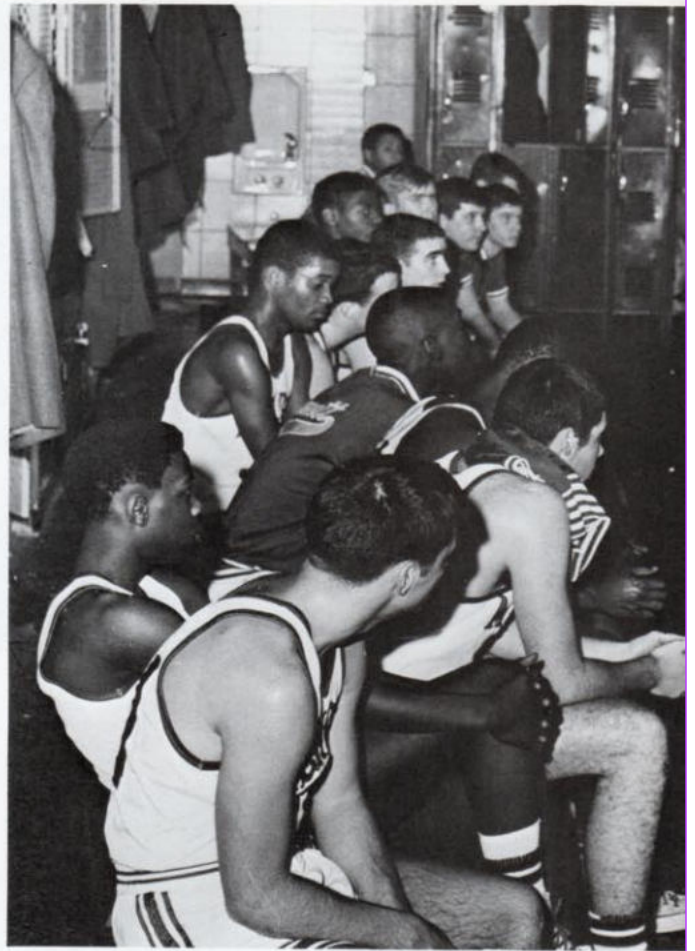
## Monarchs Finish with 1-11 League Record

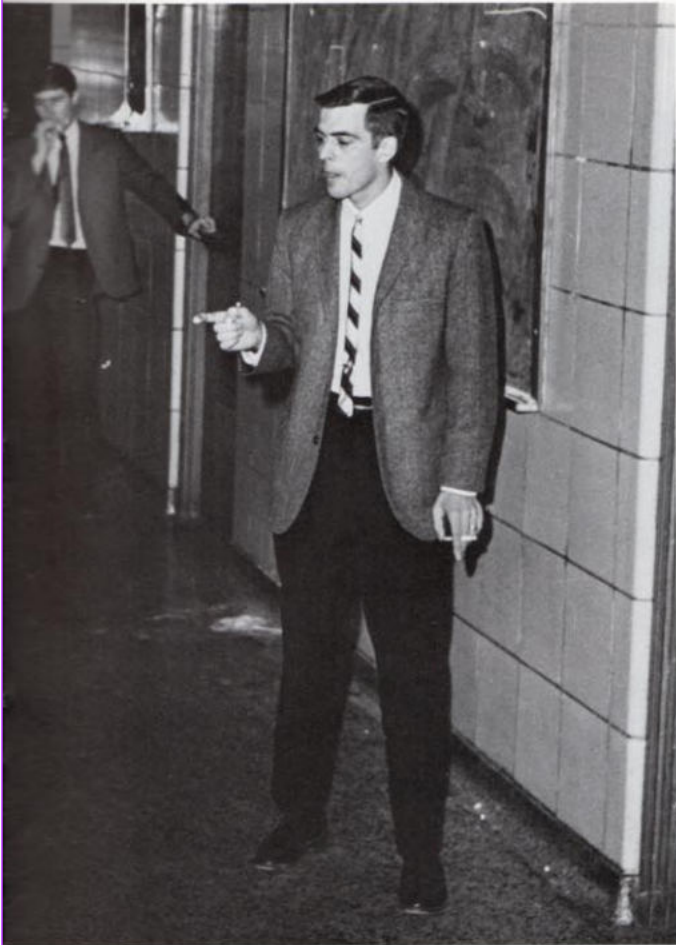


A consistent performer all season, Milt Donald displays fine form against Mt. Carmel.

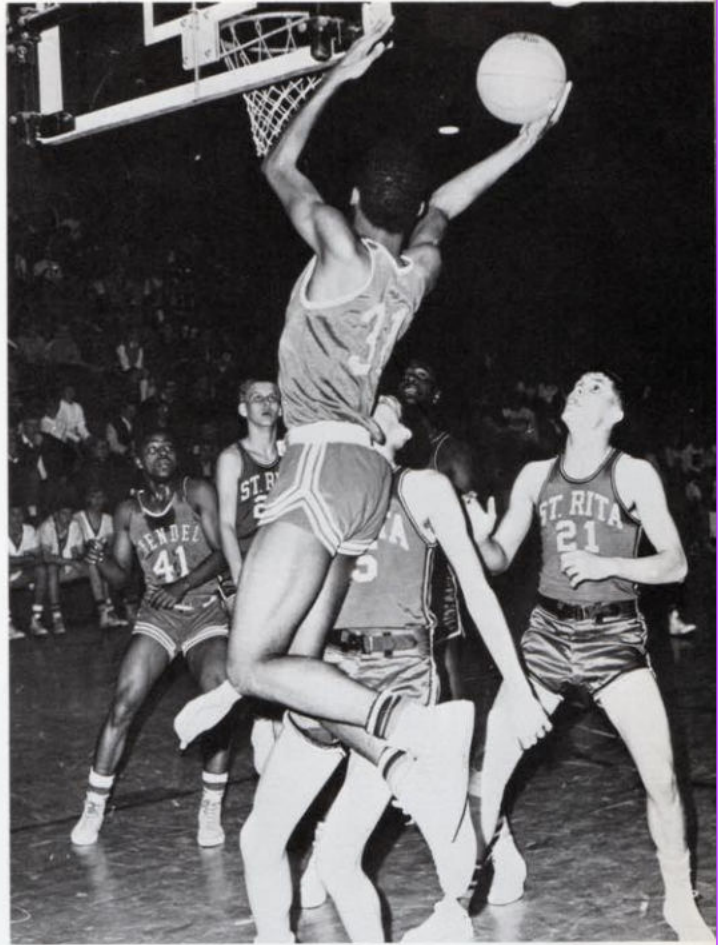


Willis Nance demonstrates the "soft touch" that won him a berth on the South Section All-Star Squad.

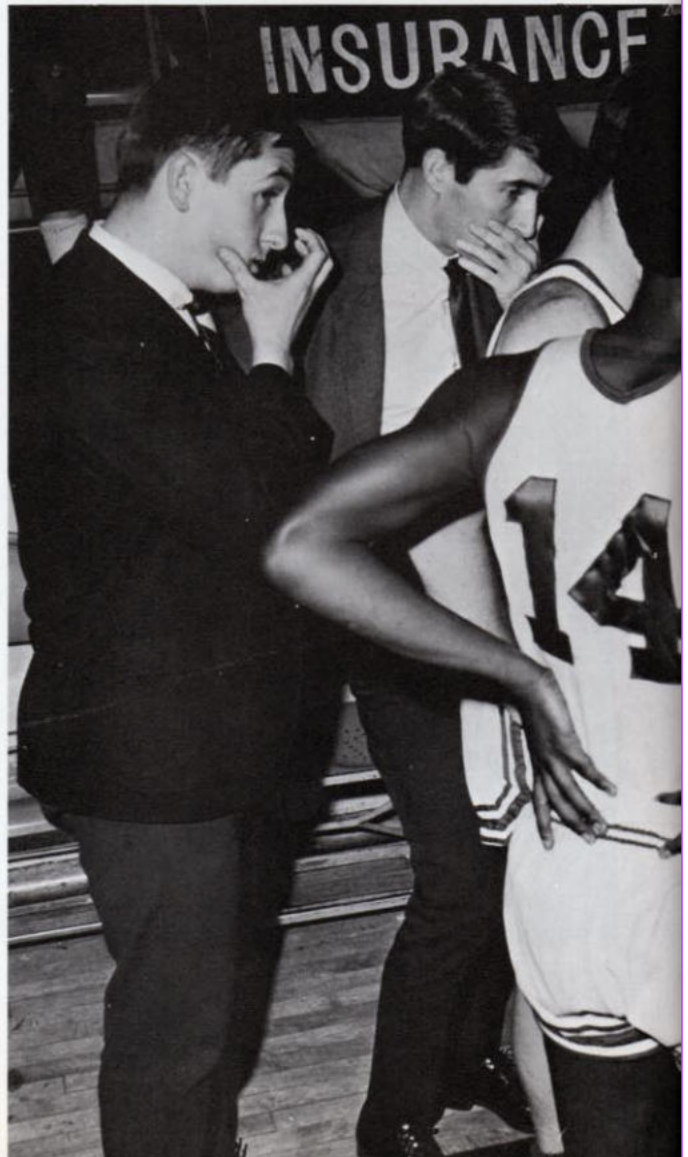

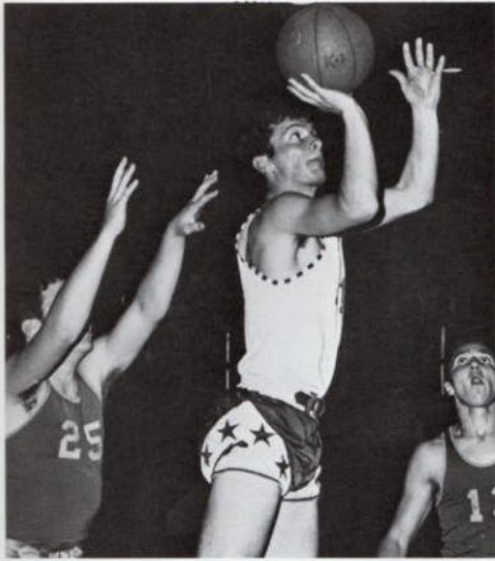

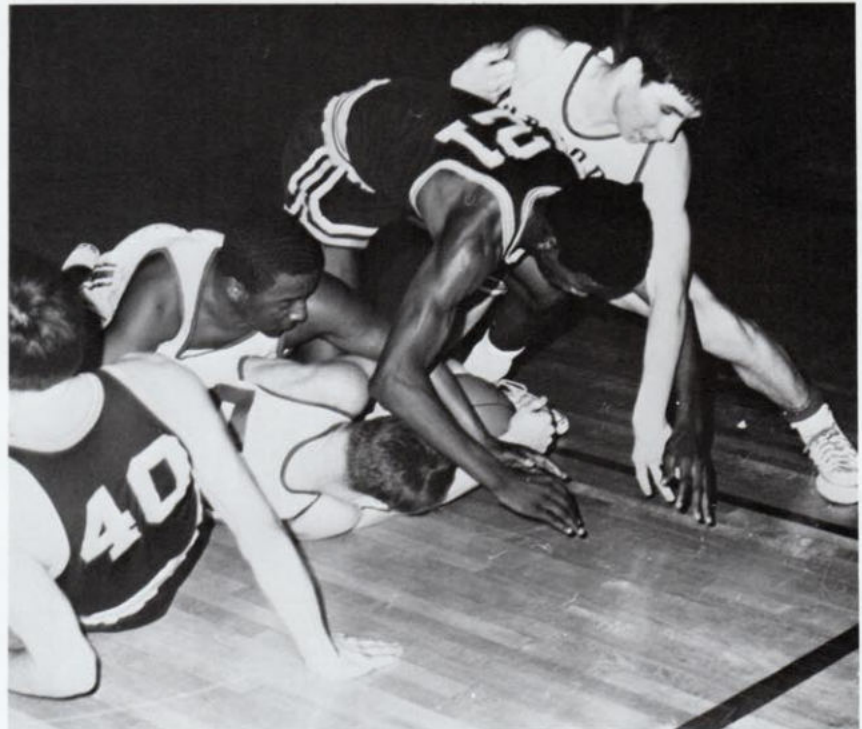

## Wrestlers Take Fifth Consecutive City Title

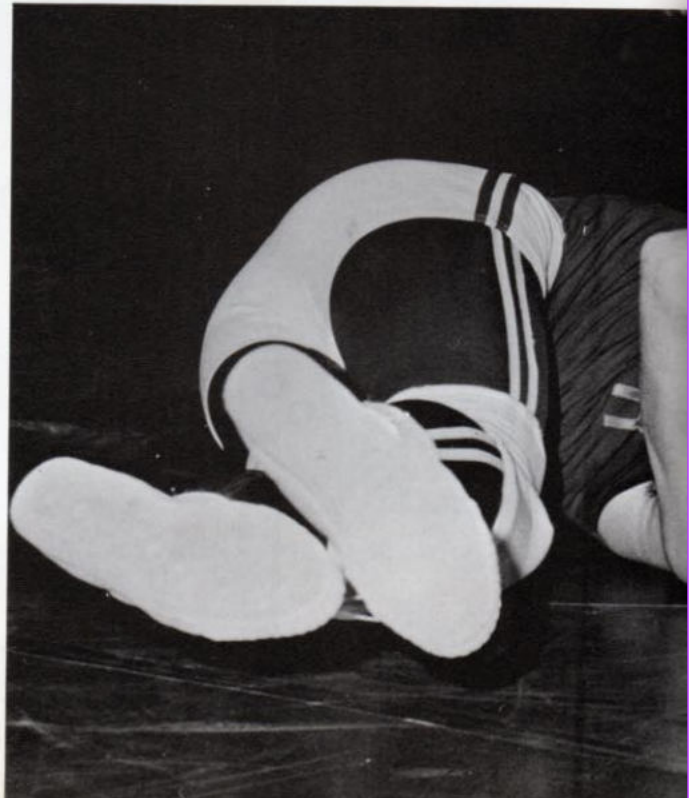

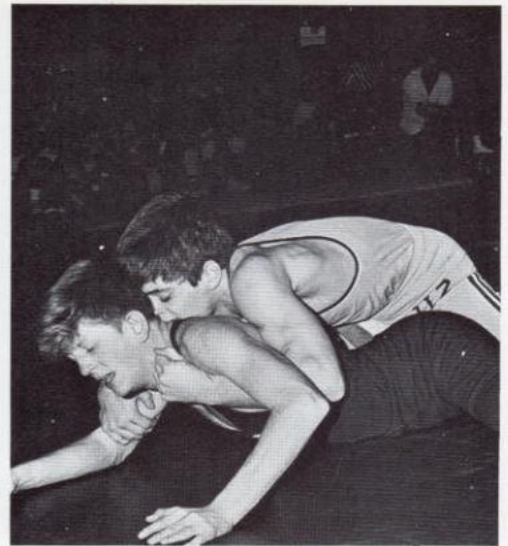

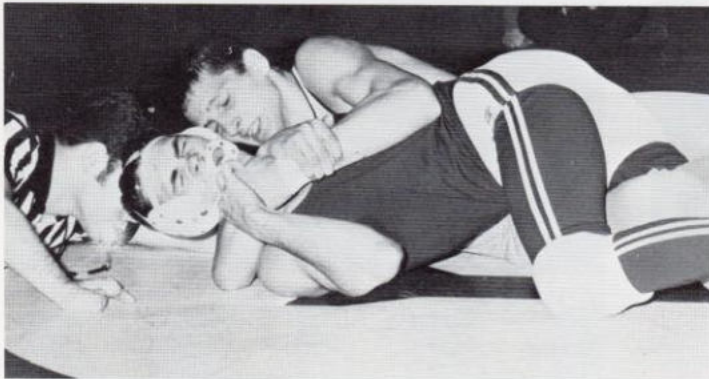




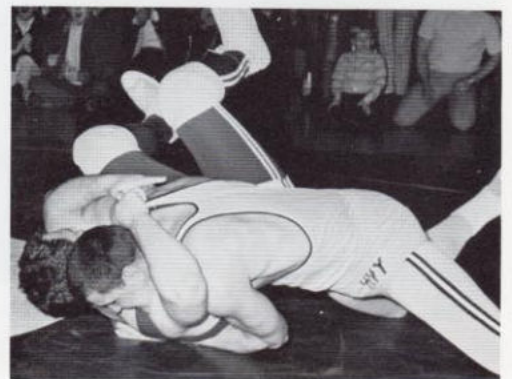

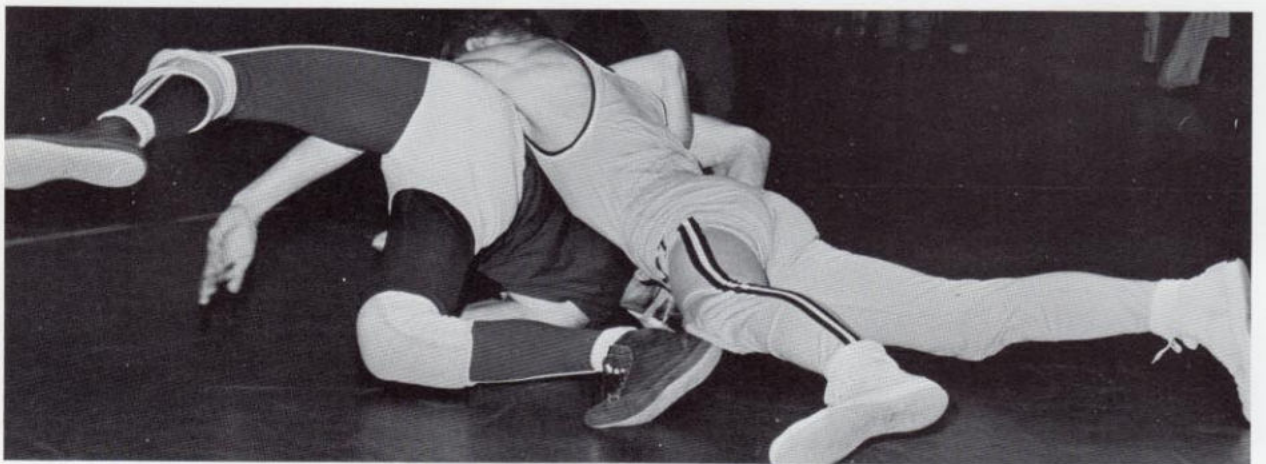

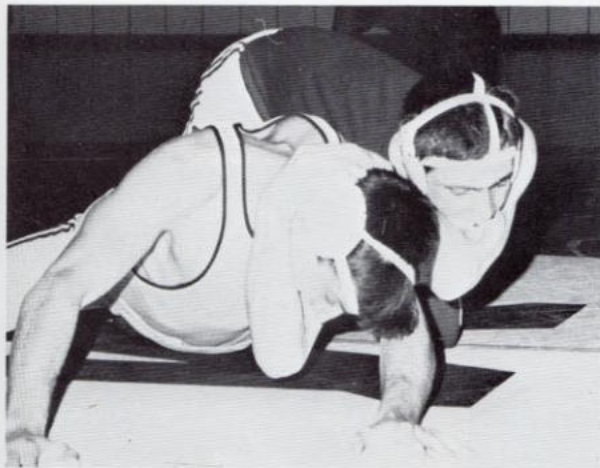

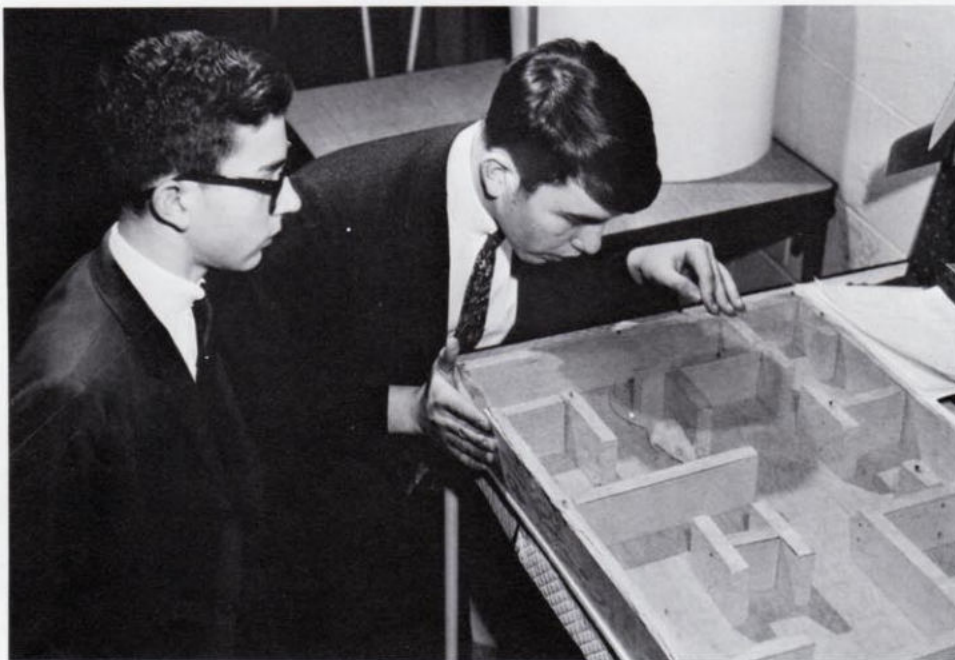

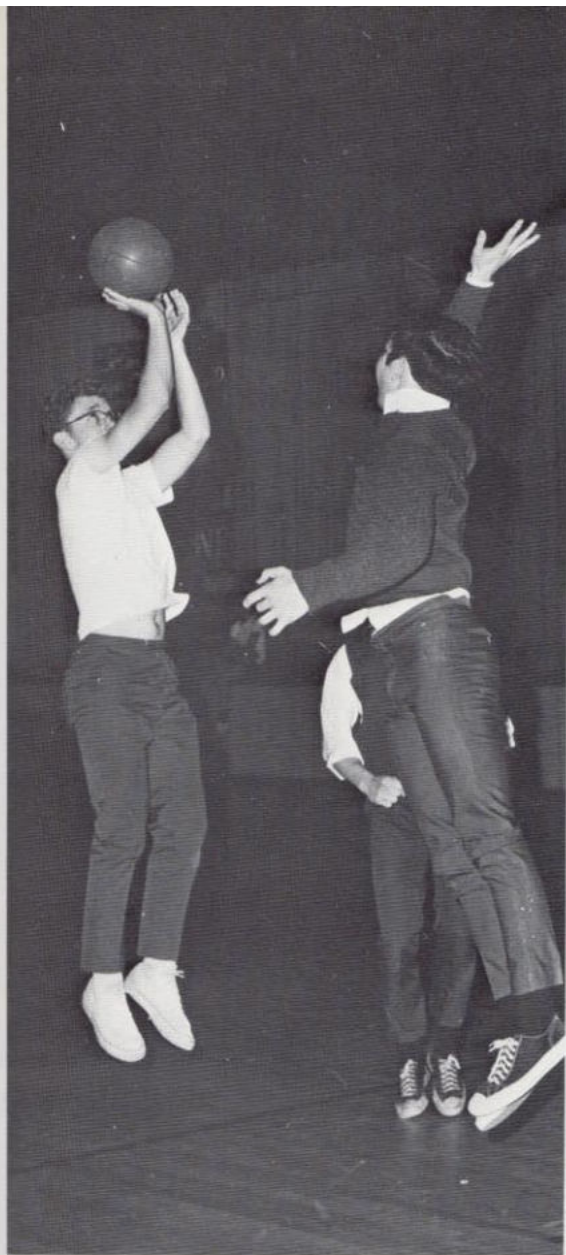

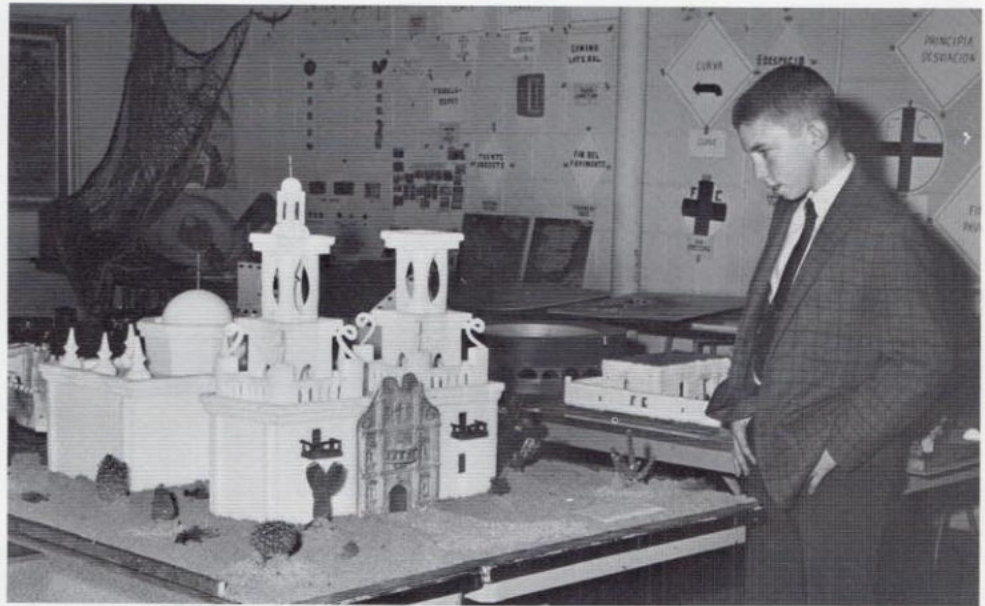

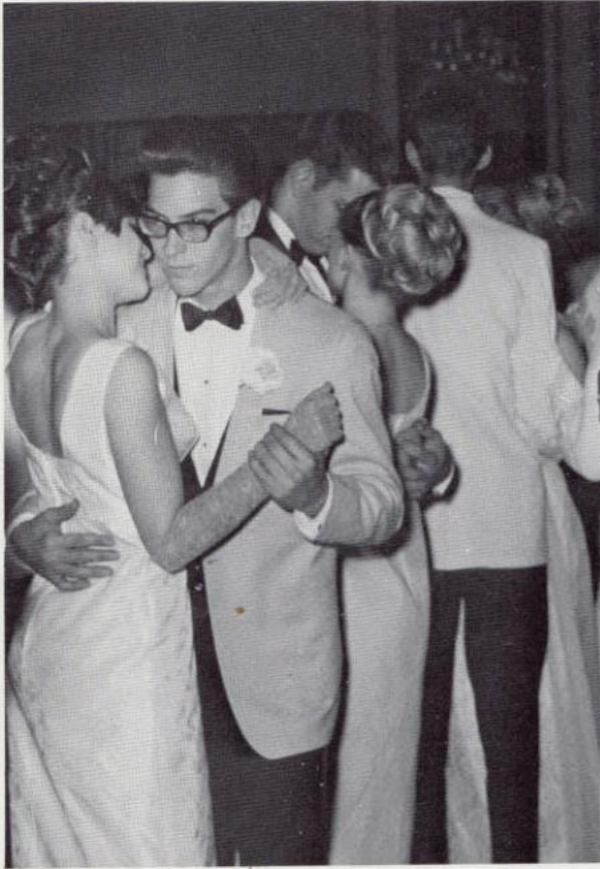

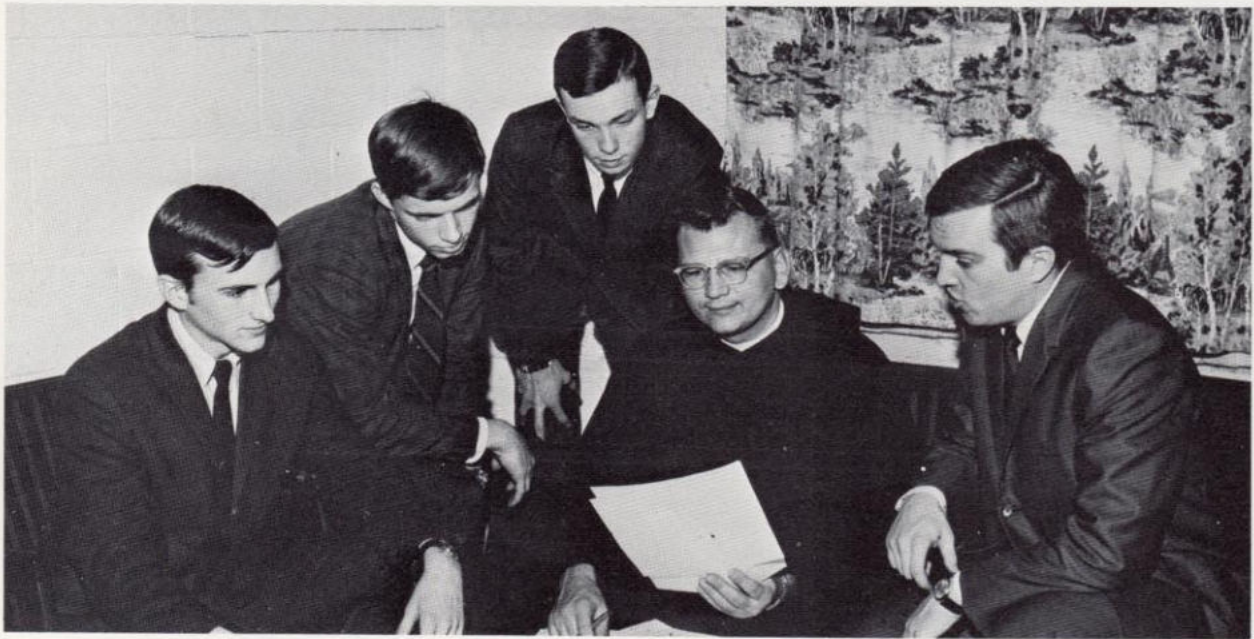
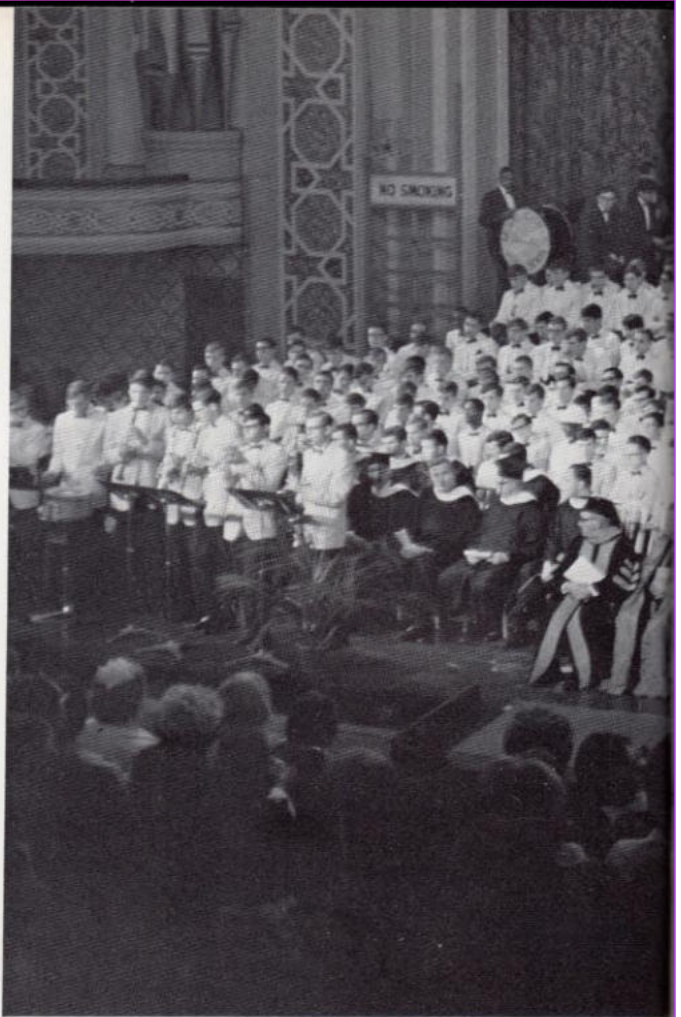
## Senior Trip, Graduation Cap Active School Year

Holding their diplomas, the graduates listen to a farewell song played by the senior members of the Mendel concert band.

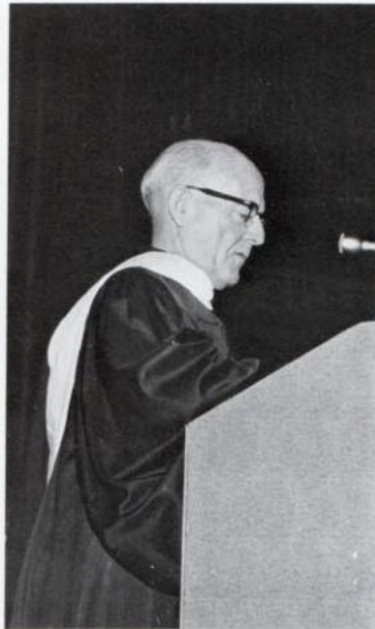

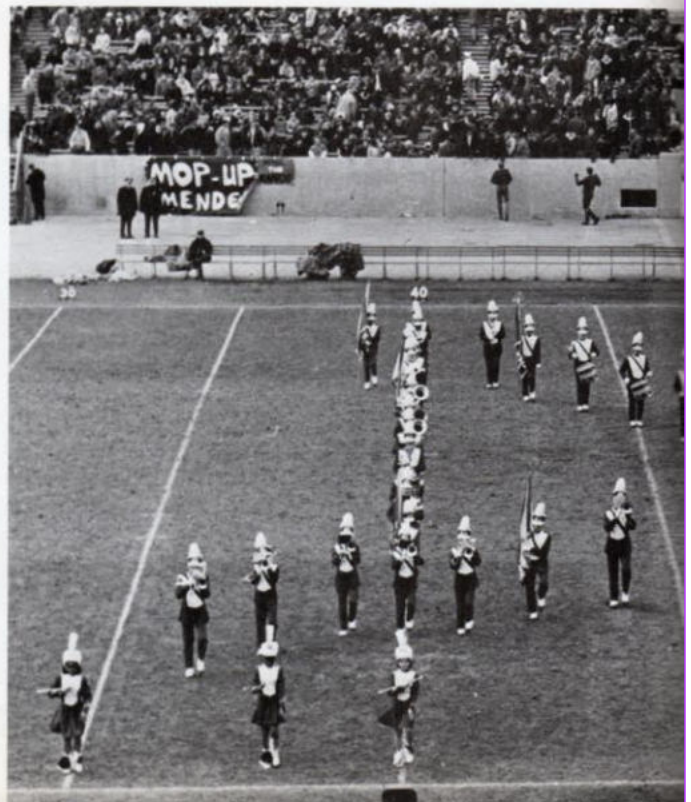

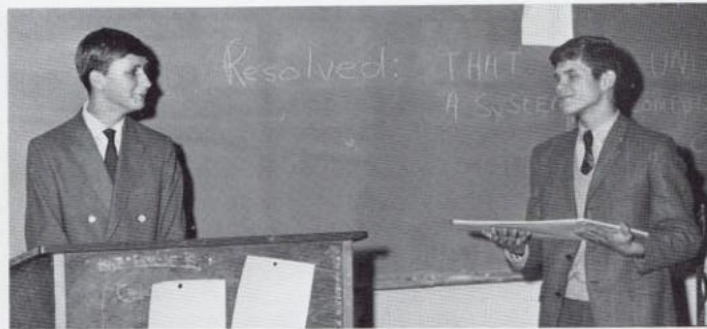

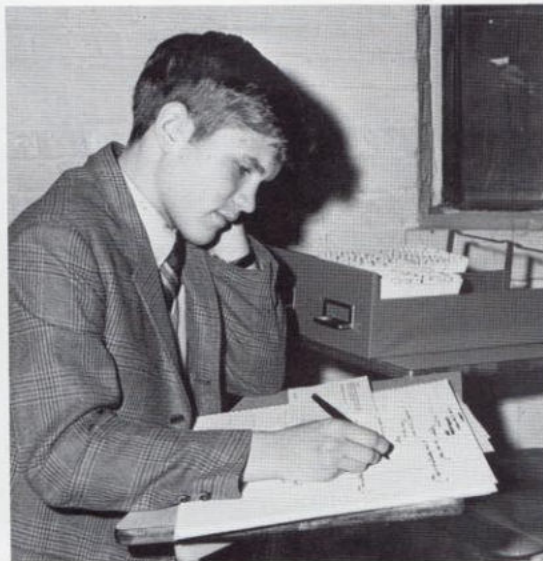

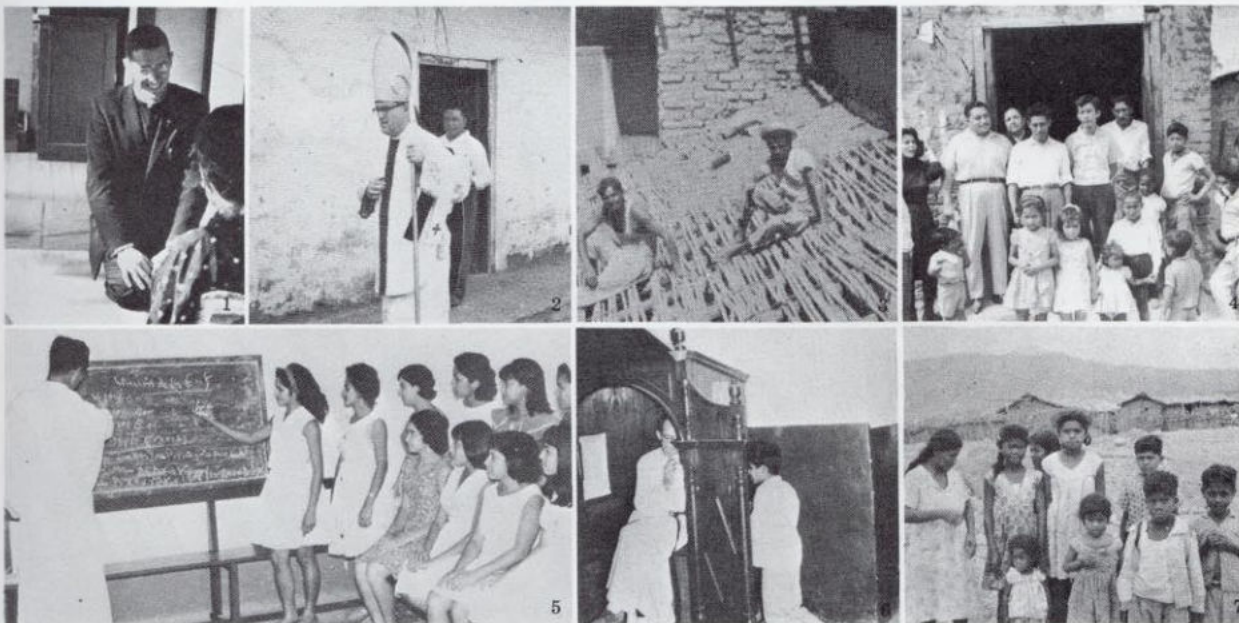
## Mission Club Sends Help to Peru, Japan

## Science Club Tours Argonne Laboratories

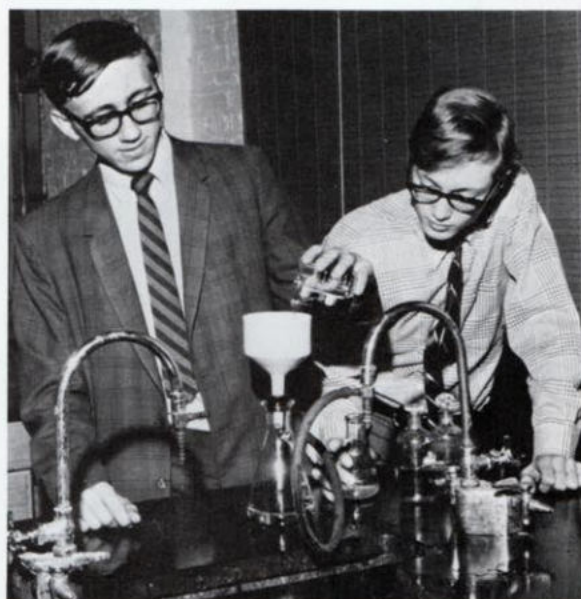

## Club Shows Coin, Stamp Displays at Open House

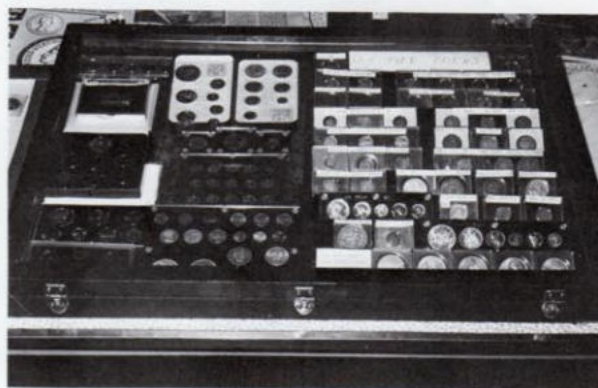

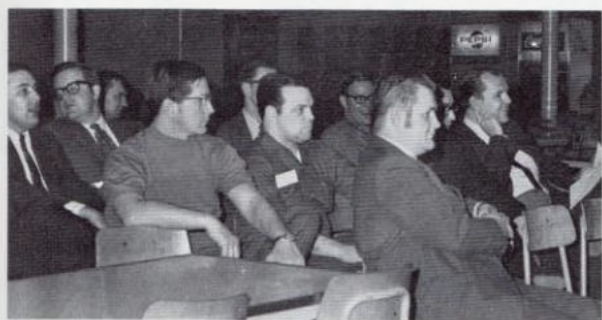

# Mendel Is 1968 Catholic League Gridiron Champion

## *Wins 18-12 Thriller Over Brother Rice*

A team of destiny, a team that overcomes adversity. Those phrases best describe Mendel's football aggregation that captured the 1968 Catholic League football title last Sunday with a heart-stopper 18-12 victory over Brother Rice in Soldier's Field.

The Monarchs, coached by Lou Guida, will now prepare for the Mayor's city championship benefit game in Soldier's Field Nov. 30 against the winner of the Phillips High-Chicago Vocational contest this Saturday.

Guida is in his third season as head football coach at Mendel. He makes a habit of taking titles for the Monarchs in local and national Catholic wrestling circles. None of the grappling championships had the emotional impact of winning a football crown in a league most coaches regard as tough as any in the nation.

The far southside of Chicago could well have a Carl Smolinski Day — for it was truly Smolinski's day last Sunday. The Monarch fullback in two seasons has been Guida's "bread-and-butter man" whenever valuable yardage was needed.

He played his best game of a sparkling career last Sunday. "The Smo" rambled for 209 yards in 32 carries for an average of 6.5 yards.

Smolinski scored two touchdowns and was denied a third on a holding penalty in the second quarter. This adverse development might have stopped an ordinary team. Instead of taking a 12-6 lead to the locker room at halftime, Mendel was locked in a 6-6 deadlock with the explosive Crusaders.

In the second half, "The Smo" barged 12 yards with

the pigskin on a muddy field the first time he carried. That set the pace for the remainder of the game.

The victory gave Mendel its second Catholic League football title. The Monarchs previously won in 1957.

Brother Rice, smarting from an earlier 32-28 loss to the Monarchs, played an exciting game. Coach Tom Mitchell's squad was up for the Mendel contest but could not contain the Monarchs' running game, particularly in the form of Smolinski.

**It was a case of a well-balanced Brother Rice attack against a stiff Mendel defense and a relentless, rolling running attack.**

It was not a day for great kicking. The muddy going and slippery football hampered the best kicker in the city — Harry Kokolus. His first extra-point try hit the left upright and he failed on one other Kokolus' punting was not up to his 40-yard-plus average.

Quarterback Rich Wyatt attempted four passes for the Monarchs. Two were intercepted and two others fell incomplete. Wyatt, however, came up with a key interception with seconds to play and Brother Rice trying in desperation to tie the game or go ahead.

Brother Rice scored first, with less than four minutes gone in the opening quarter

Bob Demes intercepted Wyatt's third effort at passing.

Quarterback Bob Jones scored on a sneak from the one-yard line to cap a 43-yard march. Jim Stalley was stopped on a running effort for two extra points.

On the kickoff, Mendel failed to move the ball for a first down. Brother Rice's second drive was stopped on the Mendel 14. Then Smolinski went into action. He ripped off gains of 15 and 27 yards to bring the ball into Crusader territory for the first time at the 44.

Steve Whitney picked up three yards and Smolinski four and eight to make it a first down on Rice's 29. "The Smo" boomed for four and five yards before Whitney scrambled for four and a first down on the 16.

Then it was "Smo" three, Noyes one, Smolinski five and four and Smolinski for the TD from the three-yard line at the beginning of the second quarter.

Smolinski gained 34 yards in five rambles and Tim Sullivan 15 in two running efforts late in the second quarter. "Smo's" TD from the two was nullified by a holding penalty and Sullivan fumbled the ball away to Brother Rice on second down at the 21-yard line.

The Monarchs in the third quarter stopped a Crusader drive on Mendel's 18-yard line after the kickoff. Smolinski then ran for 12 yards and a first down before Kokolus punted out of danger.

After an exchange of punts, deep back Jim Gill intercepted a Brother Rice aerial on the Crusader 38-yard line. Gill had been sidelined since the second game of the season with a shoulder injury.

"The Smo" toted the pigskin five times for 38

yards and into the end zone. He was stopped, however, on a PAT attempt. The tie-breaker came with 11:13 to play.

After the kickoff, Brother Rice was forced to punt on 4th down and two from their own 31. Mendel started a scoring drive from the Monarchs' 37.

The 63-yard scoring drive that meant victory began with Smolinski gaining 7, Whitney 2 and Noyes 9 yards. "The Smo" picked up a second first down in the drive with two more runs between his tackles Jack Farrell and John Daly.

Noyes went for five, Smolinski two and Noyes again for five and a first down on the 21-yard line. Whitney hit left tackle for four yards before Smolinski rambled 13 to the four-yard line. For the 3rd time in 33 efforts (including the PAT attempt) Smolinski was stopped, this time for a one-yard loss.

Noyes then skirted left end for five yards and the touchdown. Kokolus' kick attempt was blocked.

With 47 seconds left to play, Brother Rice scored on a Jones to end Chuck Miletich pass that went for 26 yards. The TD was set up by Jones' pass to Stalley for 23 yards. After Demes scampered 29 yards.

An onside kick, fumbled by a Mendel forward linesman and recovered by Brother Rice on the Monarch 48, set up the Wyatt heroics. Jones faded to pass, lost his footing and was knocked to the ground as he threw the ball forward but incomplete. Jones was injured and replaced by Mike Long.

The first aerial by Long was grabbed out of the air by Wyatt on the 16-yard line with 18 seconds to play. Wyatt lost a yard falling on the ball and time ran out.

# Mendel Romps to City Prep Title, Raps Chicago Vocational, 41-19

**HO HUM!** The Catholic league scored another Prep bowl victory over the rival City loop.

Yesterday, it was Mendel, tremendously powerful in the air and on the ground, dealing the punishment and Chicago Vocational absorbing it for the other league for the fifth time in six years.

Mendel's 41-19 triumph—the ninth in a row for the Catholic schools—was the fourth highest winning score in the 35-year history of the intracity series.

Achieved before 67,483 in Soldiers' field, it was sparked by the pro-like passing and quarterbacking of Mendel's Rich Wyatt, who threw four touchdown passes.

**IN ADDITION,** Wyatt, a 5-11, 175-pound senior with great college potential, confused the Vocational gridders with clever ball-handling on crossbucks and draw plays.

Of the 531 yards (a Prep Bowl record) Mendel piled up in its second successful bowl appearance (the Monarchs beat Calumet, 6-0, in 1957), 272 resulted from passes. Wyatt completed 12 out of 18 for 218 yards.

Mendel, which hiked the Catholic league lead in the series to 19-14 (two games were ties), picked up 21 first downs to only 10 for C. V. S.

**VOCATIONAL,** outweighed offensively and defensively by at least 13 pounds a man, could gain only 77 yards.

Of Vocational's 208 total yards gained, 131 came from passes fired by Quarterback Bruce Scholtens. One of C. V. S.'s three touchdowns resulted from a nine-yard pass by Scholtens to Cedric Cotton.

Wyatt threw three touchdown passes in the second quarter to give Mendel a 27-6 halftime lead. One went to Steve Whitney for five yards, another to Mike Noyes on a 31-yard play, and the third to End Mike Hinsberger for three yards.

Going into yesterday's game, Hinsberger, a 6-2, 170-pound junior, had caught 12 touchdown passes, most of them thrown by Wyatt.

**WYATT'S** other TD toss was to Pat Sheahan, a 6-3, 190-

pound junior, on an 18-yard play in the third period.

Mendel scored at least once in every period in posting its 10th victory in 11 games (the Monarchs' lone loss was to Mount Carmel, 41-32, in their South section schedule).

Vocational scored in the first quarter when Gil Rodriguez returned a kickoff 80 yards after Mendel had scored first. That brought Vocational within 7-6 distance of Mendel and the Cavaliers never got closer.

Vocational scored its last touchdown near the close of the contest, a quarterback sneak by Scholtens from the 1 climaxing a 68-yard drive.

**VOCATIONAL'S** John Bailey made the drive possible by intercepting a pass [each quarterback had only one pass intercepted] on his 1 and running to the 32.

Wyatt kept Vocational's defense loose with his passes and Mendel backs responded by going thru holes powerful Mendel linemen had opened.

Noyes, only 5-9, 165, but very fast, went thru Vocational's usually stingy defense for 153 yards in 15 carries for a 10.2 average, best performance by a back.

Carl Smolinski, Mendel's hard-hitting fullback who had picked up 205 yards in the 18-12 Catholic league title victory over Brother Rice two weeks ago, contributed 83 yards in 15 efforts.

**WHITNEY** was Mendel's other most effective back with 35 yards in seven carries.

Only Halfback Melvin Bolling with 67 yards in 16 carries and Scholtens with 11 yards in three tries could dent the Mendel forward wall for any yardage to speak of.

Bolling and two other regulars [Center Rich Wyrwa and End Hernan Cardona] had not played from the first game until the league semi-finals because of injuries.

Their return helped Coach Bernie O'Brien land a C. V. S. team in the Prep bowl for the seventh time.

Altho it was another decisive win for the parochial loop [the City leaguers have been outscored, 268-86 in the last eight games], every touchdown except two came the hard way, on sustained drives.

**ONLY ONCE** did a team pick up a cheap touchdown. That was in the second quarter when Mendel needed only five plays to score after a Vocational punt traveled only 24 yards to the C. V. S. 31.

The other exception was an 80-yard kickoff return.

In the first quarter, Mendel received the kickoff and drove 85 yards in five plays, Noyes scoring on the fifth play on a 68-yard run around left end.

Harry Kokolus, Mendel's soccer-style kicker, booted the conversion to make it 7-0.

Rodriguez grabbed the ensuing kickoff on his 20 and went all the way for a touchdown, an 80-yard sprint that took 13 seconds as he broke a tackle on the Mendel 45. Manuel Becker's placekick was wide.

**MENDEL** launched a six-play, 72-yard drive in the final seconds of the first period and completed it in the second with Wyatt passing five yards to Whitney for the score. A second Kokolus kick made it 14-6.

On the scoring pass, Wyatt had faked a handoff to Smolinski drew Vocational players draw play to the left. Smolinski's drew Vocational players to that side and that left Wyatt open to pass.

When Vocational's Bruce Marich punted 24 yards to his 31, Mendel used the break to march 31 yards in five plays to score again. Wyatt passed 31 yards to Noyes for the tally. Kokolus' conversion attempt was wide.

Just before the half ended, Mendel drove 78 yards in nine plays, to lead, 27-6. Wyatt passed three yards to Hinsberger for the TD and Kokolus kicked another thru the uprights.

**VOCATIONAL** could net only one yard in three rushes to start the third quarter and Mendel proceeded to march 63

yards in nine plays.

The drive was climaxed again with Wyatt faking a handoff to Smolinski then passing 18 yards to Sheahan for a touchdown. Kokolus kicked a routine placement to make it 34-6.

**THE CAVALIERS** returned the kickoff to their 39, then went 61 yards in nine plays to "trim" Mendel to 34-12. The TD came on a nine-yard toss by Scholtens to Cotton.

Early in the fourth quarter, Mendel boosted its lead to 41-12 when Tim Sullivan, a replacement for Whitney, ran nine yards inside left end for the score.

**MIDWAY** in the final period, Mendel intercepted a pass on Vocational's 30 and got to the C. V. S. 8. But Wyatt's pass was intercepted by Vocational's Bailey on his 1 and he ran to the 32.

Vocational's final touchdown came five plays later on a one-yard sneak by Scholtens. Barry Irving went thru right tackle for the extra point.

But, Mendel wanted to boost its scoring total some more and went from its 23 to Vocational's 23 as the game ended. James Bill, Wyatt's replacement at quarterback, completed two out of three passes for gains of 22 and 32 yards.
